### THE FOUR SURVIVORS.

Of seventy-two men appointed to the Senate of Canada in 1867 but four are now living and these are all now well stricken in years.

First among them is Hon. David Wark of New Brunswick, who was born near Londonderry, Ireland on 19th February, 1804. He has been in public life since 1845, when he was elected to the House of Assembly in that Province. He enjoys the distinction of having served as a legislator longer than any other man in the British Empire. Senator Wark is now in his ninety-eighth year.

Second in point of years among the four surviving original Senators of Canada is Hon. Robert Barry Dickey of Nova Scotia, who was born at Amherst in that Province on 10th November 1812. It is now more than sixty-seven years since he was appointed to the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia. Senator Dickey is now in his eighty-ninth year.

Hon. Joseph Francois Armand of Quebec is third in age among the four who have sat longest in the Senate. He was born at Riviere des Prairies, Quebec 14th December 1821. He sat in the Legislative Council of old Canada from 1858 till the union. Senator Armand is now in his eighty-first year of life, and has served forty-two years as a Legislator.

Much the junior of the other three members of the distinguished quartette is Hon. William Miller, Q. C. of Nova Scotia. He was born at Antigonish 12th February 1835. His legislative career dates from 1863 when he was elected to the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia. He was one of the youngest of the original Senators and is still the junior of many members of the Upper House that have been since appointed. Senator Miller is sixty-five years of age and has served as a Legislator thirty-eight years. It will be seen that all the four surviving Senators who were appointed in 1867 came from the eastern part of Canada. One came from Quebec, one from New Brunswick, and two from Nova Scotia. Senator Wark, the oldest of the members has been a lifelong Liberal in political faith. Senators Dickey, Armand and Miller are Conservatives.

Of late death has been busy among the members of the Senate with the effect of reducing the numbers of the Conservative membership in that House. Within a few years, should the Liberal party remain in power, the majority will be transferred to the Liberal side. It will be but small gain to the country to have this change brought about if the new majority is as strongly partisan as the old has been. What seems desirable is that in making further appointments men of independent and judicial minds should be selected. A Senate composed of able men who would view all measures from the standpoint of the welfare of the country and without party bias would be of incalculable service, but perhaps this is too much to hope for.

And now is announced that an official bulletin giving the census totals may be expected not later than August 15.

According to an Ottawa despatch Sir Louis Davies says the conference called to consider the organization of a new Supreme Court for the Empire ended in "a complete fizzle." There was nothing accomplished except to demonstrate that things had better remain as they are. So all the fine prospects of Canada being represented by a Judge with a salary of \$30,000 or so and the rank of a Lord ends in smoke.

### WANT THEIR LADYBUGS

PRINCETON, Mass., July 24.—An uprising is threatened by the agricultural dwellers among the Berkshire Hills. Their bugs are being taken from them, and they fear the consequences.

### HUMANITARIANS STIRRED.

LONDON, July 24.—Impressed by stories of the sufferings of the war in South Africa, the Church Society for the Promotion of Kindness to Animals is working to secure an extension in the terms of the Geneva convention in the direction of extending Red Cross privileges to animals and veterinary surgeons who are compelled to attend them under fire.

### SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE

LUNenburg, July 24.—To-day was registration day for the Summer school of Science, and has broken the record. No less than 231 have enrolled their names at this early date, and more are expected. The school is certainly booming at a rate never before experienced in its history. Sharp on time the classes commenced work this morning and so large was the attendance that some had to be duplicated. A most enthusiastic botanical excursion took place this afternoon under the guidance of Dr. McKay and Mr. Nelson of the P. E. I. McDonald manual training school. Enrolment continues, and persons can still join with advantage to themselves.

### CAN METAL FEEL.

At the Royal Institute in London Professor Jagadis Chandra Bose proved that they can, in much the same way as animal beings. He struck a piece of copper, pinched a piece of zinc, gave it poison and administered an antidote and threw light upon an artificial retina. In each case the electrical motion, as registered by the galvanometer, was painful to witness. There is an opening for a society for the prevention of cruelty to metals.

### DOGS OF WAR.

The latest recruit of the British army is the outpost dog. In various continental armies the dog has been trained to do "sentry go" for some time past, but it is only now that in the British army his value is being recognized. Thus the "Green Howards" (Yorkshire regiment) at the "front" have been lately ordered to provide for two or three dogs for each company, and, "as there were none in store, curs of high and low degree had to be impressed."
