Thrilling Rescue

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Dec. 5.—A thrilling story is told of the perilous experiences of the crew of the Red Funnel Fisheries trawler Gunnudeal which was wrecked on the shore a mile to the south of Cape Howe, the southernmost point of New South Wales.

An attempt was made to launch a lifeboat, but this was rendered extremely difficult by the heavy list of the vessel. The crew maintained a precarious footing near the davits, but as the boat was lowered it crashed against the ship's side and was smashed. Battered by seas and drenched to the skin the crew awaited dawn.

Meanwhile the young wireless operator, Eriksson, kept tenaciously at his post despatching S. O. S. messages on a wave-length of 220 metres. When power failed through the stoppage of the engines, Eriksson displayed great resources. Attaching an ordinary valve to a 345 volt battery, he succeeded in improvising Morse signals. By these means he directed the movements of the Australian steamers Mernoo and Saros which had heard the S. O. S. messages and swept the coast with their searchlights.

Another hero of the disaster was Tom Saunders, the second mate, a ruddy-faced, unassuming Welshman, who volunteered to swim ashore with a line. He had not gone far when the line got adrift. He turned, and after battling with the seas, succeeded in catching another line. Having reached the shore, he hauled in a stronger line, using his body as an anchor, he held the line taut as the rest of the crew hauled themselves through the raging surf.

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 5.—Dressed poultry prices, particularly for the turkeys continue to command chief interest in the egg and poultry trade and some car lot sales of turkeys had been reported, but buyers are for the most part holding off. Very low prices have been prevailing at the dressed poultry fairs and at Lyndhurst yesterday. Turkeys sold for from 25-28 cents per pound, chicken brought 23-26 cents; pullets 13-20 cents.

TORONTO.—Fresh eggs are lower here today but the market on storage stock is firmer. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extra 56-58; firsts 47-50; pullets, extra 43-45; seconds 32-33, delivered cases reduced.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.—Eggs are offering at extra 53; firsts 46; pullet extra 42. F. O. B. Fresh eggs are selling to retailers here at extra 65-68; firsts 60-62; pullet extra 55-56; seconds 30. Prices of storage eggs to retailers are extra 45-46; firsts 42-43; seconds 39. Turkeys are easier. Dealers are paying 30-35 cents delivered for birds weighing ten pounds and over.

MONTREAL.—Egg receipts here today were 756 cases as compared to 1262 cases on the corresponding day last year. The egg market is generally unchanged, but the situation in poultry is slightly easier and buyers are withholding purchases at present.

NEW YORK.—The market on dressed chickens here is dull and unchanged. Turkeys are weak and lower at 28-35 cents.

The Clean-Up Man At Capitol

Ted Wells again scores a clean beat over his colleagues of the celluloid in his latest starring vehicle, "The Clean-Up Man" a Universal Feature Western now showing at the Capitol. It is a picture that has all the essentials of a thrilling screen drama, action, comedy, a hard riding, hard shooting manly chap in the role of the hero. And when you see the handsome cowboy star trounce the villain in the last reel you'll blister your hands with applause.

Wells plays the part of a cattleman on whose ranges nature has planted huge caverns which serve as the refuge of a daring outlaw and his band of lawless henchmen. Innocently enough, the cowpuncher is suspected as playing a dual role, a sort of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde rancher, pursuing a peaceful trade to mask nefarious operations.

As Steve Banning, Ted frustrates a stage hold-up by the mysterious road agent known as the "Hawk" by playing the unwitting part of the rescuing hero to Peggy O'Day, cast as Jane Brooks, a Secret Service operator masquerading as a professor of geology, who had been detailed to snare the outlaw and his band. The girl succeeds in retaining her incognito, while the road agents also adopt a disguise as a mysterious stranger who appears and disappears with lightning like rapidity to the mystification of everyone, until finally a well laid trap is sprung and the bird of prey is ensnared.

The hero finds himself in more than one uncomfortable situation, and he has to do plenty of hard-riding, gun-drawin', and two-fisted fightin' before he clears himself of suspicion, aided and abetted by a comical negro, who with the deep rooted suspicion of his race is convinced that the outlaw leader and his band are the spirits of Black Bart and his gang, who once infested the neighborhood, but who had been laid low by the march of law and order many years before.

In the cast are included Henry Herbert, as the Hawk, who plays his dual role in convincing fashion, and Tom Carter, who looks and acts the typical fearless sheriff.

Ray Taylor, who directed the picture from the story by George Morgan and Lola D. Moore works up some novel twists and situations plentifully interspersed with side splitting comedy and corking fine action.
