Make Application For Three Cents Increase In Milk

Summerside milk distributors have made application to the Milk Control Board to have the retail price of milk increased by three cents a quart effective October 1st. It was learned yesterday that the price at 14 cents a quart, if granted, a spokesman for the Summerside Milk Producers and Distributors Association pointed out that the milk men would only receive one and a half cents of this increase. The Federal Government has been paying a subsidy direct to the producer which amounts approximately to a cent and a half a quart. This subsidy is being discontinued and the other cent and a half would go to the milk men but would be used to cover increased costs of production, he said. He also stated that there is a great hay and grain shortage in the western part of the province. He said that this is the first time in price asked by the milk men in five years.—S.

Former Islander Wins 'Save The Soil' Shield

A campaign inaugurated by the Ekville Board of Trade last winter to eradicate weeds and prevent soil erosion has received widespread notice and acclaim. The campaign was under the supervision of the Field Services Bureau of the Municipal Districts of Red Deer and Lacombe and their representatives, V. Byrckland, Red Deer, and A. Lacombe. This year the competition for the cleanest farm was entered by 27 farmers owning 61 parcels of land, which were judged twice during the summer for freedom from weeds. The total area embraced by the farms entered comprised six townships centering on Ekville. Donald MacDonald of the Ekville district was declared the winner for 1946. He was presented with the Imperial Bank of Canada shield, a banquet sponsored by the Board of Trade and held at Ekville on Tuesday evening, August 20. This trophy will be competed for annually. Representing the Department of Agriculture: H. J. Mathers, crops commissioner; H. J. Mathers, supervisor of soil conservation; A. G. Bravette, district agriculturalist; Red Deer, and Gordon R. Sterling, district agriculturalist, Lacombe. The campaign has been highly praised by both the Provincial and Dominion Departments of Agriculture, and it is believed that it will be copied in all parts of the province to help further good farming practices.
