HOME ON LEAVE - Sgts. Art Proude, and Pat Adair, Charlottetown, accompanied by Sgt. George Graham, Murray Harbour, Nova Scotia, of the P. E. I. Highlanders (Black Watch) arrived in the City last night. They will spend their furlough at their homes.

FIRE ON BRIDGE - Firemen were called out at 3.25 p. m. to extinguish a fire in the planking on Hillsborough Bridge. There was no damage as the blaze was discovered before it gained any headway. It is thought that the fire originated from a spark dropped from the train which crossed shortly before.

BODY ARRIVES - The remains of the late Miss Maria Mutch accompanied by her sister, Mrs. Hannah Pratt, arrived from Boston last evening and were taken to the McLean Funeral Home. They will be taken to the residence of her brother, William Mutch, Rocky Point today. Interment will be in Canoe Cove Cemetery, notice later.

AIR FLIGHTS - Canadian Airways schedules were carried out on time yesterday on all the regular flights. Flying conditions were reported to be good. Tuesday a trip was made to the Magdalen Islands with mail. On the return flight there were five passengers and 20 mail boxes were carried back.

RECOVERING IN HOSPITAL - The many friends of Mr. Archie Hume, Montague, will be pleased to learn that he is rapidly recovering from a recent operation at Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax. Mr. Hume is a veteran of the last war and was wounded in the Battle of Amiens, Aug. 8th, 1918. He received a charge of shrapnel in the left leg and was invalided to Canada in June, 1919. After undergoing many operations for the disability, during the intervening years, he finally had to have his leg amputated above the knee on March 26th, 1940. He had made rapid progress since the operation.

SNOW PLOUGH WORK CANCELLED - No further move to open paved highways, dirt or gravel roads to motor traffic would be made until the frost was out of the ground. Mr. L. B. MacMillan, deputy minister of public works, said last night. The use of heavy ploughs on pavements when the frost was leaving the ground was considered harmful to the surface, the deputy minister said. The road between Charlottetown and Mt. Stewart was open to traffic, and the Montague road was open as far as Alberry Plains, eight miles from the King's County town. The road between this city and Summerside was open about twelve miles out. Department officials expected it would be two weeks before further attempts were made to open roads to motor traffic.

ively used to compete with the transfers hauling to the country, he continued, as the merchant was interested in having his goods landed at his door. The speaker protested that the system if continued would be "the finishing touch" to the City truckmen and advised that "everything should be done to discourage it."

The Recorder's answer was: "You might try, but I do not think so." In answer to a question from Coun. Chandler inquiring re an infringement by a C. N. R. truck against the traffic act in the City, the Recorder stated that action could be taken against the driver. Coun. Sterns said that the Council might be a bit presuming to pass a resolution on a petition of one section of the people. He suggested that the opinion of other sections be invited. He also stated that he was not in favor of the operation of the service in the City.

The matter of a radio patrol was brought up by Coun. Sterns and he asked permission to call for tenders for the purchase of this equipment. He also took up the matter of a new generator for the patrol but was advised to interview the agent who sold the car and other articles to the purchase before proceeding further. Coun. Dougan referred to the estimate of \$500, which had been voted for a pickup truck for the street department and explained that this amount was in the budget for a second hand vehicle. In view of the fact that the department had made a saving of over \$200, already, he asked permission to purchase a new truck. Both requests for the radio and the pick up truck were granted by the Council and resolutions authorizing the calling of tenders were adopted.

The following were the resolutions adopted at the meeting: "Resolved that the City Clerk be instructed to call for tenders for the installation of Police Radio equipment and that the police committee be authorized to purchase same up to amount of estimates. Moved by Coun. J. E. Sterns and seconded by Coun. R. C. Chandler. "Resolved that this Council urge consideration by all persons and organizations concerned of the immediate and probable ill effects, to the City generally, consequent on the operation here of the C. N. R. pick up trucks against the possible benefits and that all further information obtainable be presented for consideration at the monthly meeting of April 8th. "Resolved that the City Clerk be authorized to call for tenders for the one half ton pick up truck for the Street Department. Moved by Coun. F. C. Dougan and seconded by Coun. J. T. McKee."
