STIRRING APPEAL TO RUSSIAN ARMY

PETROGRAD.—Virtually all the divergent political factions and all class organizations, councils and even Socialist leaders, with the exception of the extreme leftists, today re-echo the appeal of Minister of War Kerensky to the troops and applaud the new order of the day, "Advance."

DEADLY TORNADOES CONTINUE IN U.S.

250 People Killed, 1,200 Injured and Hundreds of Live Stock Destroyed.

(Canadian Press Despatch) CHICAGO.—Tornadoes during the last three days, in seven states of the Middle West and South, have killed nearly 250 people, injured more than 12,000, wrecked thousands of houses, killed hundreds of heads of live stock and devastated many thousands of acres of ground crops.

RELIEVING THE HAY SITUATION

AUTO PLUNGERS OFF FERRYBOAT

Mother and Son, and a Companion Were Drowned.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, MAN.—Mrs. Thomas Walker aged 35, her son William and Miss Essie Irwin, 21 were drowned at Poplar Point Ferry, when their automobile in which they were riding ran off the ferry boat into the river.

ITALIANS MAKING FURTHER ADVANCES

Have Crossed Timave River, Occupied a Village and Captured Nine Guns.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) ROME.—The Italians have crossed the Timave River and occupied the village of Sogiovanal, Gulf of Trieste. The War Office announces that they have captured nine six inch guns.

TRURO BRAKEMAN ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

(Canadian Press Despatch) MONCTON.—Owen A. Hanley, a brakeman of Truro, was killed at Memramook early Monday morning when he was struck by the freight car which he was braking. An inquest held here today attaches blame to the one but gives the cause as accidental.

THREE GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS.—The Germans delivered three attacks last night and this morning in the Champagne in the regions of Casque, Teton and Mont Blond. All were repulsed. The Germans are bombarding heavily French positions in the regions of Dead Man's Hill and Hill 304 and the Verdun front. A French detachment penetrated to the second German line near Urholtz, in Alace, and found many dead in the trenches. Prisoners were brought back.

HOSTILE RAIDERS REPULSED.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON.—Hostile raiding parties were repulsed last night northwest of Cherisy and south of Lens, says today's official report on the Franco-Belgian front operations. We inflicted a number of casualties on the enemy by rifles and machine gun fire and secured prisoners. Successful raids were made by us north of Armentieres and in the neighborhood of Wytshaete. Our troops reached the German support line and captured between twenty and thirty prisoners.

FOR ORPHANS OF SOLDIERS

GERMAN AMERICANS WANT GERMAN REPUBLIC

(Canadian Press Despatch) NEW YORK.—Germans here have formed an organization called "Friends of German Republic" whose object is the dethronement of Emperor William and the establishment of a German Republic. The organization is said to be nation wide in scope with established headquarters and has issued an appeal to the Germans to help in its propaganda.

13,000 MEN FROM MARITIME PROVINCES

OTTAWA.—In raising by conscription 100,000 additional men for service overseas, and accepting the same population basis of allotment to military districts as was adopted by the government in its former plan to secure 500,000 men by voluntary enlistment, No. 6 (maritime provinces) military district will be required to provide 13,000 men. This, on the same basis of population would mean about 5,000 men for New Brunswick or considerably less than enlisted voluntarily last year. ANTI-CONSCRIPTIONISTS RAMPANT IN HULL

(Canadian Press Despatch) OTTAWA.—Bills bearing the words "A Bas La Conscription" were plastered on the walls of buildings on the main thoroughfares of Hull last night and several parties in automobiles who threw back posters which were thrust into their machines were somewhat roughly used by a crowd of about forty young men in charge of the operations. No arrests were made.

SPANISH DEMONSTRATION IN FAVOR OF ALLIES

(Canadian Press Despatch.) MADRID.—Long reported gathering of elements in Madrid favorable to the Entente Allies was held this morning at Plaza de Fueros. There was great enthusiasm on the part of the people who were estimated to number 250,000. A counter demonstration by Germanophiles was prevented by the authorities to prevent disturbances.

IRISH ANGERED AT GERMAN PIRACY

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON.—According to stories printed in the morning papers there has been a complete revulsion of feeling toward the war in the south and southwest of Ireland as a consequence of recent attacks by German submarines on the Irish fishing fleet. A number of fishing boats were sunk and the victims of an attack off Ballymore say that the Germans told them that they had already sunk the Kinsale and Waterford fleets and would soon put all the Irish fishing boats to the bottom of the sea because they sent fish to England. They also threatened to shell villages of the coast.

RUSSIANS REPEL TURKISH ATTACKS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD.—On the Russo-Gallian and Roumanian fronts rifle fire occurred, says today's official statement. On the Caucasian front two Turkish attempts against the heights south of Baneh, near the Persian frontier, were repulsed by our fire. Twelve bombs were thrown from an enemy airplane on our air-drome northwest of Lunista.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES

OTTAWA.—In today's casualty list of 156 names there are 25 killed in action, ten dead of wounds, and 41 missing. Of the latter two are believed killed. Two previously missing men have been located.

THE WEATHER, TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) TORONTO, May 29.—Increasing easterly winds at first, followed by showers. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 52 degrees above. At 10 a.m. it was 37; above; at 9 a.m. it was 35 above. The coldest the previous night was 43 above. The tide will be high this afternoon at 4:20 and tomorrow at 5:39; it will be high tomorrow morning at 5:22 and Thursday at 6:08. The sun sets this evening at 7:54 and tomorrow at 7:55; it rises tomorrow morning at 4:35 and Thursday at 4:37. The moon sets tomorrow morning at 1:07. The first quarter of the moon was on Monday, May 28th at 6:34 p.m. The moon will be full on Thursday, June 5th at 8:07 a.m. The length of today will be fifteen hours and eighteen minutes.
