Electors Appealed To By His Honour Lt. Gov. Dalton, Premier Lea And Hon. J. D. Stewart

To the People of Prince Edward Island

Anticipating the assembling in February 1932 of a great Disarmament Conference at Geneva, at which all the great nations of the world will be represented, the League of Nations Society in Canada, and kindred organizations in many countries, are seeking by the circulation of a monster petition to bring to the gathering an overwhelming expression of the desire of the nations for disarmament and abiding peace.

A Preparatory Commission appointed by the League of Nations in 1925 has presented an outline Treaty which will be the basis for discussion by the Conference.

It is alarming to find that in these days when the memory of the horrors of the Great War is still fresh the armaments expenditure of the great nations is larger than in the days preceding the war and that the tendency is to increase rather than to decrease the expenditure.

If this state of affairs continues there can be but one outcome—sooner or later the nations will again be plunged into the horrors of strife, and such a strife would be far more terrible than any that has been before. In the words of the late Viscount Gray—"The enormous growth of Armaments in Europe, the sense of insecurity and fear caused by them—it was these that made war inevitable."

We believe that the present economic distress which is causing so much anxiety in all the countries of the world is traceable in large measure, if not entirely caused, by the enormous waste of resources represented by what is called military preparedness, and great states men have expressed the opinion that economic normalcy can only be restored by disarmament on a large scale.

Surely the International Agreements which have already been made have greatly reduced the necessity for an extravagant expenditure upon arms, representing we are told some \$4,500,000,000 annually. If the nations will only determine, one by one, to have done with this folly it must be possible to find a better arbiter of international peace. The leading statesmen in our own Dominion have joined hands most heartily in support of this movement towards disarmament and international peace, and in the Motherland leaders of all political affiliations have united upon a common platform to impress upon the nation and Empire the urgent
