FOX FARMING.—Since commenting on the Gesspere Black Fox Ranching Company, your correspondent has had an opportunity to see the extent of the business in this neighborhood. It is foxes to right of us, foxes to left of us, and goodness knows where they will be next, unless it turns to be foxes inside of us, for sometimes the owners are as foxy as the foxes, no doubt the natural result of companionship. The foxes for about thirty years, and the big extent of the business in this neighborhood. What is reported as the most important ranch of the lot can be found at Oulton's Corner where Trenchholm Oulton ranks as one of the largest individual fox owners among the lot.
