## Some Changes In Procedure For Mobilization

OTTAWA, Nov. 16—(CP)—As the transfer of military jurisdiction from the Department of War Services to the National Selective Service approaches, consideration is being given to some administrative changes in the mobilization procedure.  
One of the matters receiving attention is the procedure in medical examination. The possibility of having all potential draftees given a military medical examination as soon as they are eligible for compulsory call is being reviewed.  
The advantage of such a step would be that it would let the men and their employers know their medical status from the point of view of the draft at the earliest possible moment and so make it possible to plan for the future.  
Compulsory reporting for the reserve army was also understood to be receiving active consideration. While there are a number of questions relating to this to be settled in principle may come at any time. It is believed that three groups would likely be affected by compulsory service in the reserve: single men between 19 and 40 inclusive who are in the age group callable for active army service but who are ruled ineligible because of medical category; single men who are in high medical category but who are given postponements of call because they are key men in essential industry; and married men.  
Under the present system of medical examinations, divisional War Services boards send out notices advising men to report to doctors of their own choice for examination. After their local doctors report a man in category "A" he gets
