FAMOUS WAR PICTURES COMING

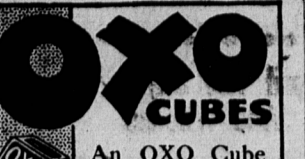
Art Exhibition and Tropies of War to be Displayed Here.

Lieut G. Shouldis, in charge of the official war photographs and captured German field guns which made such a sensation when placed on exhibition in the Grafton Galleries in London, England and more recently in St. John N.B., arrived in the city last night. These pictures, which it is pleasing to learn are to be shown here are actual enlarged photographs taken both on and off the battlefields by the Canadian Official War Records photographers.

There are a total of 144 pictures in all, ranging in size from 12 x 20 feet to two feet square. The pictures are to be shown here under the auspices of the Great War Veterans Association. Premier Arsenault, has shown the deepest interest in the proposal to give the people of Prince Edward Island an opportunity to see this wonderful collection of war views and trophies and the members of the G.W.V. A. feel deeply grateful towards him. Through his efforts it is pleasing to state the use of Prince of Wales College Hall is being given gratis for the purpose. It is expected that the exhibition will open on Thursday the 10th inst and continue to the 12th.

Jamaica to Issue Its Own Money

The Governor will leave soon for London where he will confer with the British Government authorities relative to a loan of one million pounds to defray the expenses of carrying out projected enterprises on the island.

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Express Rates.
In regard to express rates, Mr. Messervy took this matter up with Mr. Nicholson, M. P., when he was in Ottawa and after his return sent the following message: March 14, 1919.

D. Nicholson, M. P.:
House of Commons, Ottawa:
Express companies will shortly charge 25 cents per 100 pounds all year round on goods coming and going by Car-Ferry in addition to regular mileage rates. Residents of Cape Breton only paying express charges on mileage rate on Car-Ferry between Mulgrave and Point Tupper and no additional mileage is exacted from them. Kindly see the minister quickly and have him instruct express

ISLAND TRADE INTERESTS DISCUSSED

Hon. Mr. Kennedy and Mr. J. A. Messervy Go Into Matters with Gen. Supt. Brown.

Hon. M. Kennedy and Mr. J. A. Messervy returned Saturday from Moncton where they discussed matters of vital importance to the trade interests of P. E. Island, with General-Superintendent Brown. They report that the General Superintendent is in favor of standardizing the railway and doing away with the third rail as quickly as possible.

The Superintendent says that the Car-ferry steamer will be taken off as early as possible to go on the marine slip at Halifax and the Northumberland will take her place between Point-du-Chene and Summerside. After the return of the Car-ferry and after the change of timetable the Car-ferry will make two round trips each day.

Empty Freight Cars.
Other years during spring and fall it has been a great hardship to get cars, especially in the fall. The Superintendent gives assurance that after the standardization of the rail this difficulty will be solved and he hoped to have no more complaints along this line regarding freight and refrigerator cars. He will do his utmost to have mud cars available. It is intended to place an up-to-date station at Emerald Junction and extend the yard facilities there and in Charlottetown.

Tenders are now being called at Ottawa to operate a service between Montreal, Summerside, Charlottetown and Newfoundland, but in the event of plans falling through the Superintendent thinks that with the steamers they will have ready shortly, they will be able as a last resort to operate this route during the summer months, and they are strongly of the opinion that during the winter months they must operate a line of steamers between Sydney, or Louisburg and St. John's, Nfld. The reason for this is the large accumulation of cars every winter at these points which cannot be moved.

Mr. Hayes who has for the past few years given special attention to please P. E. Island, is succeeded by Mr. Brown, who in the opinion of Messrs Kennedy and Messervy will do all in his power to pay special attention to the trade interests of the Island.
