TUESDAY.
PROHIBITION.—Before Stipendiary Magistrate Shaw, David Egan of Mt. Stewart, was on Saturday, the 19th, convicted of first offence against the Prohibition Act and fined \$100.00 and costs or three months in jail.

THE DECISION.—A meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A., Charlottetown, yesterday afternoon to consider the advisability of forming a branch of the World's Evangelical Alliance here. After general business, etc., the all-important question was taken up and dealt with in a considerate manner. After a lengthy discussion it was decided, finally, that a branch of the Alliance would not be formed here till the coming autumn.

TEACHER'S MEETING.—A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Provincial Teachers Association was held in the office of the Charlottetown School Board on Saturday. Every member was present. It was decided to hold the next annual convention of the Association on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of Exhibition week, and arrangements were made to provide an unusually attractive program for that occasion. The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "The Executive Committee of the Provincial Teachers Association desires to place upon record its appreciation of what the Government has done and proposed to do for the promotion of education and the better payment of teachers."

The annual examinations for probationers for the Methodist Ministry in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island were held at St. John, Sackville and Charlottetown yesterday. Rev. Neil McLaughlin reports that there were no candidates writing in this city, says a Frederickton Exchange. Mr. George Somers, a senior at Mount Allison University Sackville, was among those who wrote the examinations at that place. SHEEP INDUSTRY.—Mr. J. A. Teller of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, arrived on the Island Monday evening and is holding meetings throughout the Province this week in the interests of the Sheep Industry, a branch which both the Federal and Provincial authorities are doing their utmost to encourage. During Mr. Teller's course of lectures throughout the week, starting at St. Peter's on Tuesday evening, the 22nd, Winsloe Wednesday evening, Emerald Thursday evening and Grand River Friday evening, he proposes to talk over his plans which will be followed up later in the season by giving dipping demonstrations. He wishes the farmers to become acquainted with the advantages to be gained in the regular dipping of sheep. Following this week he will make farm to farm visits as much as possible in these sections, arranging for dipping later. At any rate it is confidently felt that it will be worth every farmer's time to make a point to attend these gatherings as Mr. Teller will make them most interesting, discussing fully the care and management of a flock of sheep.
