—Florence Leard, daughter of the late Ed. Leard, North Tryon, died at a hospital in Boston from blood poisoning on Saturday, March 30th and word was received Saturday evening by telegraph. Miss Leard, who left home last summer to work in Boston, had been sick in the hospital for some weeks, but her people at home did not expect the news of her death, in fact, they expected her home as soon as she was able. The remains are expected at Albany this Tuesday evening, and the funeral will take place the following day. Besides her mother, there are two brothers at home—Frank and Fred. Much sorrow is expressed for the family and for Mrs. Leard who has had a great deal of trouble to bear during the past number of years.

—A very pleasant evening was spent at the Methodist Church, Tryon, last Wednesday. Although it was a congregational meeting, many people from other denominations were there. —On Tuesday afternoon, March 26th a very large funeral cortege wended its way from the home of James F. McNutt, of Darnley, to the beautiful cemetery of Malpeque Church. This large gathering was evidence of the deep sympathy felt by the community in the death of Mrs. McNutt, who had the misfortune ten weeks ago, to have her clothing drawn into an open fire, thereby suffering very severe burns upon the hands, face, and body. Though the wounds healed splendidly under the skillful treatment of Dr. James Keir the shock was too great for a lady of such advanced years, and on Sunday night last she passed peacefully away to the Eternal home. Mrs. McNutt was the last of the family of George Benisto of the North Shore, Fowles, (grandfather of the present George F.) and had reached almost 80 years of age, having been married 53 years to Mr. McNutt who survives and for whom every sympathy is felt in the present bereavement. She was a faithful member of the Presbyterian Church, devoted to her home and family, and always exercised a true and kindly hospitality. All the members of the family have been spared viz. George B. on the homestead, Peter and Robert on adjacent farms. Mr. Hattie spoke at the service at the house from Rev. 14, 13—"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."
