Declines To

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Statement of Commission. The statement of the boundary commission follows: "The Irish boundary commission held a further meeting today. Since its previous meeting, November 5 to November 7, the commission has been in communication with the British Government and with the Government of the Irish Free State and Northern Ireland. The replies received from the British Government and Northern Ireland indicate, in respect to inquiries made by the commission, that neither of these two Governments desire to submit a statement to be considered or to appear before it by counsel or otherwise.

"The Government of the Free State in response to similar inquiries made a formal statement with regard to Article 12 of a treaty between Great Britain and Ireland, under which the commission has been constituted. The response received from the Government of the Free State intimated that it was desirous of appearing before the commission by counsel.

Smugglers Are

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near Martha's Vineyard. There the customs men halted a bootlegger, who, when he heard who they were, sped in the other direction as fast as possible.

Meanwhile the food supply on the boat was running low and the fresh water had disappeared. The crew had to use cracked ice whenever they wanted water.

A day or two later, off Martha's Vineyard, the three men hailed a passing boat, the owner of which was a bootlegger en route to rum row.

They covered him with a machine gun and finally induced him to plot them to Woods Hole, Mass., 55 miles away.

At Woods Hole they took up a collection and rewarded the bootlegger for towing them in. They left the boat there for necessary repairs.

Word of the loss of a rum running tug with her eleven men and a \$400,000 cargo of rum somewhere between New London, Conn., and Newport, R. I. was received in this city today.

The tug was the William Maloney according to such information as was obtainable. She was formerly the Capital, had been out, it was said, to the vessels in the rum fleet lying off Montauk Point.

There she had taken on 10,000 cases of rum valued at \$40 a case, and started for New London.

She reached New London safely and then set a course for Newport. The last known of her was when, at four o'clock on the afternoon of a week ago last Sunday, she spoke to another steamer and signalled that all was well.

Both vessels were in the midst of the storm. The storm increased in fury after that hour and the only opposition of those in this city who were interested in the tug's voyage is that she was engulfed and went down with all hands.
