Canadian Hydro Plants Captivate the Imagination of the World

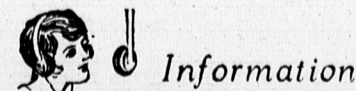

Mrs. R. J. McDonald, Charlottetown, is spending the week end with her sister, Mrs. C. W. Croken, Freetown.

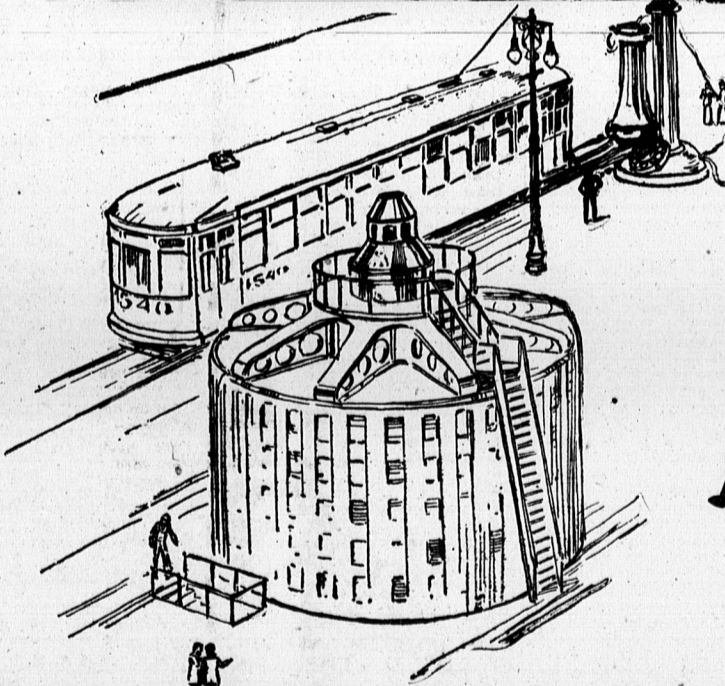

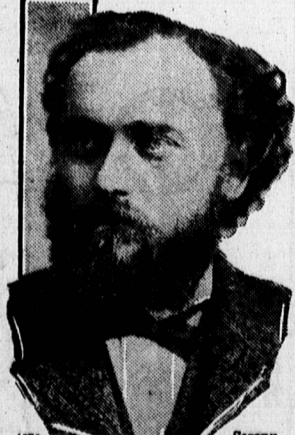
