THE ROOF OF THE WORLD.

The latest advices from the expedition into Thibet are not quite reassuring. The armed resistance to Col. Younghusband's advance has been strengthened and the determination to prevent his march to Lhasa is very pronounced. The British column appears to have been strengthened sufficiently by reinforcements sent forward from India to ensure its safety, but is probably not yet strong enough to force its way to the capital of the Grand Lama. Khangma, where the latest battle was fought, is at the forks of the main road, one branch of which leads to the British mission at Gyantse, and the other branch to Lhasa. In their attack on Khangma 116 Thibetans were killed, while only one of the Indian troops defending the position lost his life. This disparity in casualties shows pretty clearly the superiority of the Indian troops to the Thibetans in fighting equipment, but the numbers and fanatical courage of the enemy have also to be reckoned with.

Thibet has been called the roof of the world because of its great elevation. Khangma, where the latest battle was fought, is 13,800 feet above the level of the ocean. The Karo pass, between Khangma and Lhasa is at an elevation of 16,000 feet, or over three miles above sea level. These are altitudes of which we ordinarily have little conception. They are literally above the clouds. Outside the rude highways through the valleys and mountain passes the country is almost absolutely impassable. What these conditions mean as to the passage of an army and the conveyance of guns, munitions and supplies can readily be guessed. The expedition must and will press on toward its lofty, mysterious and almost inaccessible destination. We infer that Col. Younghusband will remain on the defensive until further reinforcements reach him.

JAPAN'S TERMS OF PEACE

A recent public utterance of Baron Kodama, Chief of the Japanese Army Staff, a report of which has been cabled from Tokio to the New York Sun, throws more light than we previously had upon the conditions of peace which Japan is disposed to insist upon and the point at which her aggressive military operations may cease. He says:

I am unable to anticipate the campaign or indicate the possible stopping point of the general advance, but when our army is so situated as to be able to block Russia's monopoly of products destined for Manchuria and to guarantee the maintenance of the open door, Japan's aims will have been accomplished and the chief causes of the war done away with. Remember that Japan has already achieved her first contention—that is, the independence of Korea.

These terms are moderate from the Japanese standpoint, and also from the standpoint of fair-minded neutrals, and they are also in accord with Japan's diplomatic contentions before the war began. Her purposes in Manchuria to be able to block Russia's monopoly of products for that province and to guarantee the maintenance of the open door will be gained when she obtains possession of Port Arthur and New Chwang and sufficiently establishes her dominance on the Korean Bay littoral.

But not yet will Russia consent to peace on any such terms. Recent advices from St. Petersburg, which are believed to be authentic, report the Czar as now full of confidence that his armies will ultimately triumph. He has expressed his willingness to sacrifice a million men if necessary in order to defeat Japan and restore the waning prestige of Russia as a military power. He is reported to be deceived in regard to the real state of the country and made to believe that the war is popular. With the bureaucracy re-established in full control of the Czar's mind and conscience, the war must go on until his armies have either gained most substantial victories or suffered irretrievable defeat.
