**GOLDWIN SMITH ON CHAMBERLAIN,**  
 Discusses Colonial Secretary's Birmingham Speech.

British People Unalterably Opposed to Tax Colonel Dennison Says the Address is a Great Triumph.

OTTAWA, May 17.—The speech of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, at Birmingham, has added a new interest to the question of the British preference in Canada, and the important declaration made by the colonial secretary is the subject of general conversation to-day.

Mr. Chamberlain has revived his statement made at the colonial conference at London, England, and now admits that the preference has been of great advantage to the motherland. He quotes Mr. Fielding's reference in the budget speech to the preference, which shows that he has been studying the financial and trade position of Canada for himself, and he regrets that he was not able to accept the offer made by Canada at the colonial conference.

He lays stress on the attitude, which Canada took on leading the way to preferential trade, a course which has since been approved by Australia and South Africa, and which Mr. Chamberlain said if he had his way, would be made reciprocal in Britain.

The opposition in the Canadian parliament will not likely propose a resolution for the repeal of the preference this session. It was laid aside from the budget debate with, as the leader of the opposition said, the view of being taken up by itself.

**GOLDWIN SMITH'S OPINION.**

Toronto, May 17.—Goldwin Smith, interviewed in reference to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's Birmingham free trade utterances said:

"Free trade, in the full sense of the term we cannot have, so long as we have indirect taxation. Every nation must have a tariff and the tariff must be adopted to its special circumstances, geographical and economical.

"The question is, whether Mr. Chamberlain or anyone else can devise a tariff suited to the geographical and economical circumstances of every member of the scattered British empire. Unless he can do this, he can hardly be successful in creating a Zollverein.

"Those who flatter themselves that the speeches of Chamberlain and Balfour are proof that protectionists are gaining ground will probably find themselves mistaken. The speeches show plainly enough they would retain the duty on grain if they dared but they do not dare. They know the great majority of the people are still resolutely opposed to any tax on bread stuffs."

Col. Geo. T. Dennison, president of the British Empire League, said:

lines of what we of the British Empire League have been trying to impress upon Mr. Chamberlain, upon the British government, and upon the British people for years past. It is an indication that Mr. Chamberlain having studied the question well is now prepared to stake his whole future as a statement on the success of preferential trade policy within the empire. It will build up Canada and enable us to do more of our share in defence of the empire, as we should do. I look upon it as a tremendous triumph. But there is one thing we shall have to avoid as we would a plague and that is, having anything to do in way of reciprocity with the United States. My own opinion is Mr. Chamberlain having had the courage to take the matter up, we shall eventually see a preferential trade policy of the British Empire."

Col. Dennison will attend the annual meeting of the British Empire League, to be held in Ottawa Monday night, when this latest tribute to the wisdom of their policy will be discussed and acted upon.
