SLIGHT MOVEMENT SHOWN IN LOND ON TOWER HALL

Ancient Tower, However, Not In Any Danger, According to Expert Opinion.

LONDON, April 24.—There is a slight movement of the quay wall and the Salt Tower of the Tower of London, according to the annual report of the National Physical Laboratory, but the Office of Works states that the movement is almost imperceptible and does not entail any danger to any part of the Tower.

Extremely fine micrometer instruments were necessary to observe the movement, and the National Laboratory in their report state:—

"Periodic observations of the movements of the quay wall and the Salt Tower have been carried out throughout the year. The main displacements are in a vertical direction and indicate a small but measurable sinking of the foundations of the masonry. In June, at the request of His Majesty's Office of Works, an examination was made of the west wall of the sergeant's mess, in which several cracks had suddenly appeared on May 20. This is a modern building erected by the War Department in 1902 and has not previously given any indication of irregular settlement. These cracks have been kept under observation since they were first noted, but have so far shown no signs of extension, so that there appears to be no justification for fitting crack micrometers. The advisability, in the event of further disturbances, of examining the foundations of this building, which are partly modern and partly very old, has been pointed out to H. M. Office of Works.

A close watch has been kept on the buildings of the tower for years. The foundations are also periodically examined, but nothing has occurred to give rise to any concern. The proximity of the Tower to the river may possibly have an effect, and even the rise and fall of the tide probably alters the pressure under the foundations. The movement in the Tower, an official of the Office of Works stated, was so slight as to be almost imperceptible, and only extremely sensitive instruments could measure it. The crack in the modern addition was thought to be due to the fact that part of the building was placed on an old foundation wall.

The Salt Tower is situated at the south-east corner of the old fortress, and next to the White Tower, is the most ancient of all. It was in very old days called Julius Caesar's Tower, probably because the Roman wall built by Julius Caesar had its south-east corner close to the site. The Salt Tower itself was built in the reign of William Rufus, between 1087 and 1100, and it is not clear whether it has derived its name from some forgotten person or from being used for the storage of saltpetre when this was an ingredient in gunpowder.

PROCEEDINGS IN THE FEDERAL PARLIAMENT

(From Our Own Correspondent)

OTTAWA, Ont., April 24.—The Hon. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce, announced last evening that Dr. H. M. Tory, president of the University of Alberta, has accepted the position of President of the National Research Council of Canada, the appointment to become effective on June 1st. It is proposed to spend \$750,000 this year for the erection of national laboratories and a total of \$3,000,000 in industrial research to be spread over a period of ten years.

The new national research laboratories will combine the functions of the Bureau of Standards at Washington and the Mellon Institute at Pittsburgh. When the laboratories have been established it will be possible for the council to carry on national standardization research service for Canada such as now exists in practically every important industrial country throughout the world. The council will also be able to effectively assist Canadian industries in the solution of the technical problems and the development of the natural resources.

Dr. Tory has been president of the research council in an honorary capacity since 1925 but in view of the increased activities and great expansion proposed it has been decided that the President's entire time should be devoted to duties of his office. He is a native of Guysboro, N. S., and a brother of the Lieutenant Governor of that province. For a number of years he has been engaged in educational work in the west and for some time was employed by the Dominion Government in investigating rural credit and is author of the present rural credit act.

For the sixth time a bill to amend the criminal code so as to eliminate section 98 in respect of sedition which came into effect as the result of the strike of 1913 was discussed last evening. This section is strongly opposed by organized labour in Canada and its elimination is sponsored by the Minister of Justice.

This bill has been passed five times previously by the House of Commons but each time it has been killed in the Senate. The Hon. Mr. Lapointe intends to keep at it until it is passed, at least until the Liberals have a majority in the upper house which he thinks will be soon.

The opinion is now freely expressed that if Parliament as is so indicated is to finish its session by the 24th of May it will have to work fast. There are half a dozen important committees to report, a large number of private bills, mostly divorce cases, to be considered and the estimates, both main and supplementary to pass. To get through, it will be necessary to suspend the eleven o'clock rule and hold three sessions a day.

This morning there was an interesting session of the railway and shipping committee. Sir Henry Thornton and a staff of Canadian National officials gave evidence as to the operations of the Canadian merchant marine, now officially known as the Canadian National vessels. Sir Henry was very happy in many of his remarks and never at a loss under a cross fire.

In connection with some of the important details of work in which the committee is interested he asked that the press should be excluded and that there was anything that the public should not know but it was undesirable that competitors should be able to take advantage of information that would be necessarily revealed.

Whereupon William Duff remarked that he hoped that the Canadian merchant marine was not carrying on illicit trade on the high seas.

"That is something, Mr. Duff, upon which you should be an authority" was the reply, and the members of the committee including Mr. Duff roared with laughter. Later Duff complained that the merchant marine was engaging in trade with Porto Rico in competition with private companies which was unfair and in explanation it was stated that the service was undertaken at the request of merchants of Halifax who wanted direct routing.

In addition to a long statement of the financial affairs of the merchant marine service assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, and so forth, Sir Henry Thornton was questioned on the present usefulness, and probable future of the system. While it was being operated at a loss it served very useful purposes in connection with the Canadian National and in services otherwise by means of subventions from the government and in developing trade in the seven seas. It was proposed were to be made De Novo now to construct a steamship service on the same lines he would not favor it, but we had it and we ought to make the best use possible of it. He was not without hopes for the eventually it would be on a paying basis.

A long discussion took place as to the wisdom of writing down the book values of the fleet to actual present valuations and not having large interest charges on the debt side that would never be paid. It would give the operating staff a chance to show what could be done on a fair basis of unencumbered assets. Sir Henry would like to see it done, but it was a matter for the committee to recommend to parliament.

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GREAT BOUTS AT L. P. U. HALL LAST NIGHT

Everything in a boxer's repertoire figuratively speaking, was on the bill-of-fare offered at the L. P. U. Hall last night before a crowded audience, which at times almost reached a frenzy of excitement as each and every round was tolled off in the different bouts on the well balanced card.

There were three bouts last night, one three rounder and two six minute rounds—amateur rules. The first bout between Young Bridges and Harold Mahar, ended in a draw after a hectic three rounds of lively mixing. These boys fought like trojans and at the final bell received hearty applause.

The semi final with Gus Longaphie and Kaney McDonald doing the honors, was even more exciting than the first. This bout went six rounds, Longaphie being awarded the decision by a very narrow margin. In the early rounds it looked as

though Longaphie would be master of the situation throughout, but the indomitable courage of McDonald helped him to weather the storm and stage a strong finish. In fact it looked hazy for Longaphie in the fourth, when McDonald landed two overhand rights to the head without a return to force his man to the ropes in a groggy condition. However, in the fifth and sixth Longaphie with a slight lead, boxed craftily to regain his strength and finished as strong as his opponent.

The Prime Minister promised to take it up with the Canadian Minister at Washington.

In reply to Mr. Woodsworth the Minister of Immigration said there was no further news as to the unemployment situation in Winnipeg. The Supreme Court of Canada this morning gave unanimous decision against the rights of women to a seat in the Senate on the ground that they were not "persons" in the sense or intention of the framers of the B. N. A. Act.

This afternoon Minister of Justice Lapointe stated that the Government was favorable to an amendment to the Canadian constitution which would give to women in the upper house equal rights with those in commons.

In reply to a question by a Toronto member the Hon. Mr. Robb stated that there was not sufficient funds to pay the 55 per cent. on the dollar dividend to the depositors of the Home Bank. He was not yet prepared to say whether the Government would in the estimates place a sum sufficient to carry out the original intention, but was favorably disposed to meeting them in part at least.

The rest of the afternoon was devoted to the Government's programme of improvements to be carried out by the federal district commission in Ottawa and surrounding district. The Prime Minister on the second reading of the bill spoke for over an hour, and in a comprehensive speech dealt with the proposals as a national undertaking in beautifying Ottawa as the capital in a manner worthy of a great nation of the future, and in that connection he dealt with other capitals, ancient and modern, as reflecting the spirit and glories of their nations.

He especially dealt with the capitals of the Provinces contending that with comparatively limited resources they had done much more in creating beautiful surroundings and environment than had the Dominion. The proposals are to enable the Federal District Commission to expend \$200,000 for 30 years and to appropriate \$3,000,000 for the acquisition of the Russell House and other properties necessary for the scheme.

The Hon. Mr. Bennett gave adherence to the policy of beautifying Ottawa and district, but thought the sum involved, \$9,000,000 in all, was too great in view of the \$2,500,000 indebtedness of the country and the requirements of other parts of Canada. It is a question of being able to afford it. We should cut our coat according to our cloth and carry out improvements as resources from year to year have justified and in that connection he mentioned in strong terms the principle of delegating powers of expending large sums of money to commissions as unsound and not in accordance with principles of responsible government. All expenditures of money should be reviewed by the House and authorized by Parliament.

Mr. Evans (Rosetown) was opposed to the whole thing. Church of Toronto and Dr. Edwards (Frontenac) opposed the scheme in the strongest possible terms while the bill was as heartily supported by Mr. Chevrier from Ottawa. The Rev. T. W. Bird, Nelson, gave the proposals his blessing on grounds of beauty and fine surroundings having an uplifting effect on the mass of the people. The debate carried on this evening after recess.
