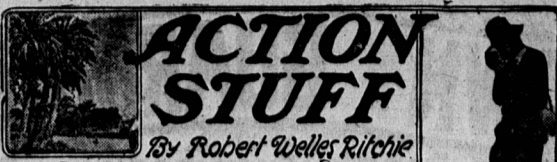

ACTION STUFF

Where the Grapevine Twineth

No direct personal merit redounds to me from the circumstances of this yarn, so I may tell without appearing to be stepping on the automatic bouquet-thrower.

When Fred Brandt, once of Hoboken, and I were trying to get out a daily American newspaper in Yokohama there was not an embarrassing growth of roses along our path. Once the old Washington hand-picked broke down—but that belongs in another place.

In the absence of any cable service from home, we had gone hat in hand to the American residents of the Japanese city and cajoled from them a sufficient sum to pay for twenty-five words of cable stuff a day to come from San Francisco to Yokohama, via Manila. The news of the United States in twenty-five words!

The mad men who used to throw together the Manila papers got fifty words a day from their San Francisco correspondent and shot half of it—always the best half—under the China Sea to our lonely outpost of up-and-going journalism. Very often it taxed our ingenuity to interpret our meager message, but never were we at a loss to "smoke up" the news despatches once we felt sure we had decoded them correctly. Stuff of dreams, you know.

One day among our twenty-five precious words occurred these: "Explosion Missouri six dead. Just those four fragrant pieces in a picture puzzle. I retired into the silences with them."

Next day the Japan Advertiser carried under its proud "Special Cable Service" line a vivid despatch from Cienfuegos, Cuba, telling how in the midst of battle many of the Atlantic Fleet in Caribbean waters there had been a flare-back from one of the big guns in the forward turret—forward, mind you—of the battleship Missouri; how a brave young lieutenant—name supplied—had acted with heroic energy to close the doors over the powder hoist and thus prevented burning shreds in the magazine and causing the destruction of the great ship.

Well, that was that. Twelve days later came a copy of the Manila Cable News, which enjoyed fifty words to our twenty-five. The Manila paper had a paragraph about an explosion in a sugar refinery in St. Louis, Missouri—six dead. Eighteen days after the appearance of the Japan Advertiser's cable story came papers from San Francisco. On the front page was a story about an explosion in the forward turret of the battleship Missouri during battle practice in the Philippine waters. It told how a brave young lieutenant had prevented the destruction of the ship—though six of his crew were killed—by closing the trap over the powder hoist. The name of that hero, however, was not the name given in the Advertiser's cable despatch. (Copyright 1924.)

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FORTUNE'S FOOL

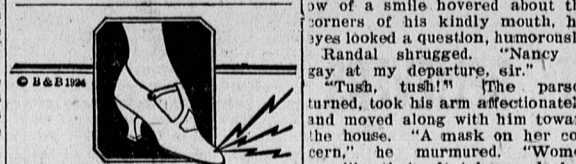

McDonald Gov't. Announce Cuts in Estimates

(British United Press) LONDON, Mar. 5.—Britain's Labor government has set an example to the rest of the world in reducing cost of government. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced a cut totalling \$225,000,000 in preliminary estimates. The total sum called for is \$1,445,000,000 compared to \$1,635,000,000 last year. The complete revenue needs of Britain for the coming year will be \$3,920,000,000. With four weeks of the financial year to run the realized surplus of revenue over expenditure stands at \$145,000,000 part of which saving will likely be used to effect a cut of one penny a pound on the tea and sugar duties and to make some abatement of the entertainment tax. The only departments not slated for a reduction are Education, Old Age Pensions and the Scientific and Industrial Research Department of the British Museum.

SANITATION KEY TO CONTROL OF POULTRY DISEASES

There are two principal classes into which all poultry diseases may be roughly grouped—infectious and nutritional disorders. Of the former groups, tuberculosis and cholera are the most common, among adults fowls and the various types of white diarrhoea among chicks. Probably the losses from all of the adult diseases together, do not equal the losses due to nutritional troubles, which are often the primary cause of losses by infectious disease. A fowl with a high degree of health and vitality will throw off most infections without harm, but if the vitality has been depleted by poor sanitary or feeding conditions the bird falls easy prey to any infection that happens along. So it is that strict attention to sanitation and by science and feeding tends to control in a large measure.

British Newspaper Deal Creates Interest

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Mar. 5.—The latest big newspaper deal whereby Sir William Berry, proprietor of the Sunday Times and Daily Graphic, is reported to have bought the papers formerly owned by Sir Edward Hulton and purchased last October by Lord Rothermere and Lord Beaverbrook in the name of the Daily Mail trust, created considerable interest in Fleet Street and on the stock exchange. The price said to have been paid by Sir William is \$25,000,000.

are all disease conditions. (When fowls are unaccountably, the wise course always is to examine minutely inside and out for indications of the cause, and if none can be found, watch carefully for further developments and immediately separate from the flock every fowl that does not appear perfectly bright and lively. A fowl that stands about with sullied plumage and listless air is not a well fowl, unless perchance the paleness is caused by mites sucking the blood. Those poultry keepers who practice using the axe promptly on every fowl that shows such preliminary symptoms, have little to contend with in the form of disease. The axe is a stern remedy, but the cheapest and the least work in the long run if real disease is present, while if parasites are causing the trouble the remedy is obvious. This practically all comes under the head of sanitation which is the real key to disease control.
