That Body of Yours

FEWER OPERATIONS NOW FOR ULCERS OF STOMACH AND INTESTINE

There isn't any question but that surgery provides a short cut in curing many ailments. It saves a great amount of time, worry, and expense in gall bladder infection, gonorrhea, cancer anywhere in the body, infected tonsils and other conditions. Treatment by medicine, X-ray, radium, and other methods is often too slow for both patient and physician and may be a waste of valuable time.

There is one ailment, however, in which surgery is not used as much as formerly because it has been found that medical treatment faithfully carried out brings more satisfactory results. This is ulcer of the stomach and of the first part of small intestine (duodenum). Peptic ulcer is the name given it.

Dr. C. W. Cutler, Jr., New York, in Annals of Surgery, Philadelphia, states that from 1924 to 1927, 262 patients had been operated upon for chronic peptic ulcer at the Roosevelt Hospital, New York. Part of interest to observe that year by year the number of operations performed for peptic ulcer has become less despite the fact that the number of cases admitted to hospital has not decreased. In 1926 there were forty-six such operations, in 1936 but twelve. This change has been due to the fact that it is now recognized that careful medical management is capable of relieving or controlling a considerable number of these cases. Surgery is used only when medical treatment has failed or dangerous complications have arisen.

As showing how peptic ulcer is now a case for medical, not surgical, treatment Dr. Cutler says: "Not only is no patient operated on at the Roosevelt Hospital without having a thorough controlled, and efficient course of medical management, but each patient for whom operation is proposed must be passed by a 'court' consisting of a physician, surgeon, stomach and intestine specialist, and an X-ray specialist. Even the type of operation and the reason therefore is determined by certain guiding principles."

It is now realized that certain types of individuals—nervous, slender, emotional—are most likely to "grow" ulcers. By teaching them how and what to eat, how to rest, how to acquire poise or calmness, the formation of peptic ulcers can often be prevented.


