The notorious Emma Goldman has published in a Chicago Anarchist paper an impudent article in which she lauds Czolgoz and indulges in maudlin sympathy for the assassin. The Chicago post office authorities have refused to permit the paper to pass through the mails, until they receive instructions from Washington.

Among a number of letters on hand is that of Observer which will appear tomorrow arguing that with the increased rates exacted from citizens for private lighting the Light and Power Company could afford to light the streets free, and calling upon the City Council to protect the rights of citizens before they sign the street lighting contract.

By the year 1835 the United States was absolutely free of debt and began to accumulate a surplus. In 1841 a small debt began. It was then over 13 millions, and stood at something over 50 millions when the Civil War broke out. In 1866 it reached its maximum of \$2,773,236,173. The present net debt of the United States including greenbacks, is \$1,100,000,000 or \$14 per head. The sinking funds will probably extinguish the debt by 1920 if no new debt is incurred in the meantime.

The financial accounts of the recent performance of Zephra in Charlottetown have now been made public and are in every way most satisfactory. The handsome amount of \$306.25 was realized for the Monument Fund. Besides a vast amount of artistic and healthful pastime was afforded to the general public. The performance throughout was most creditable to all who took part and to the city as well.
