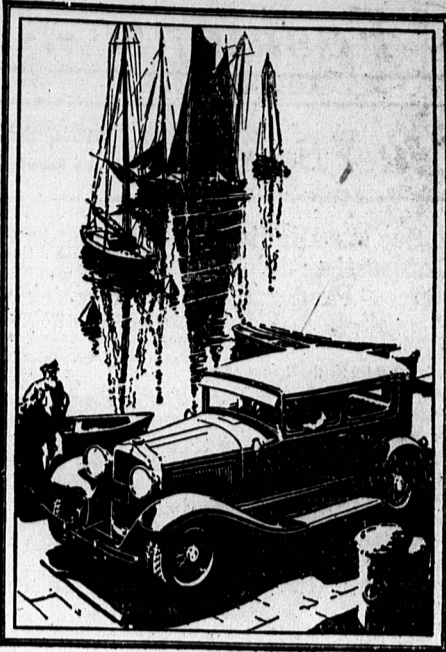

Moncton Again Blanked By The Abegweits

Local Team Wins N. B. P. E. Baseball Championship When They Defeat Moncton 4 to Nil "Putty" Connors Hurls Great Ball.

Playing errorless ball behind the superb hurling of "Putty" Connors, the Abegweits again turned back the Moncton C. C.'s at the Abegweit Grounds yesterday afternoon by a score of four to nil. The locals, by virtue of their win yesterday, are now champions of New Brunswick and P. E. Island with the right to play off with Yarmouth for the Maritime title.

As was the case in Moncton last week, it was the strong right arm of the Abegweit hurling ace that was mainly responsible for victory, allowing the Monctonians only five scattered hits and sending sixteen of them back to their bench via the strikeout route. Connors has now pitched twenty full innings against the C. C.'s without being scored upon, which is surely some hurling.

The Moncton hurler was also in rare form letting the Abbies down with five safe ones and fanning nine batters at the plate, but errors by his teammates proved his undoing.

The game, one of the best played here in recent years, was hard fought throughout, with the issue always in doubt; the locals played consistently steady ball, while on the other hand, the visitors had costly errors marked up against them, paving the way for three Abegweit runs.

The Abbies scores came in the first, sixth and eighth cantos, getting one apiece in the first and sixth and two in the eighth.

The C. C.'s two big threats to score came in the first and eighth sessions when they got a man on third each time, with only one down, but Connors was equal to the occasion, bearing down and striking out the next two batters in each case.
