Want All Of Canada "Dry."

TORONTO, Mar. 28.—From all over Canada next week prohibitionists will go to Ottawa looking to the wind-up of the alcoholic problem. Rev. Ben Spence, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, will leave Toronto tonight. On Tuesday morning the "drys" of the Dominion will convene under the auspices of the Dominion Alliance Council. At noon presentations will be made to the Premier.

To Mr. King will be submitted the views of Canadian prohibitionists.

Toronto and other centres great and small, from ocean to ocean, will have their delegates. The precise form their submission to the Cabinet shall take will be settled when the temperance workers meet, but the action taken will be another step in the arid way that is intended to abolish whiskey and its kindred.

"All that we have done in the past" said Mr. Spence, today, "has been by way of preparation. The final is drawing near, license reduction, local option and provincial prohibition have been good in their way, but they have been but a means to an end. We want prohibition of manufacture, importation, exportation and transportation."

"The present intolerable situation on the border will be emphasized to the Premier. The conditions there will be condemned as inconsistent and nationally shameful. Immediate relief will be urged."
