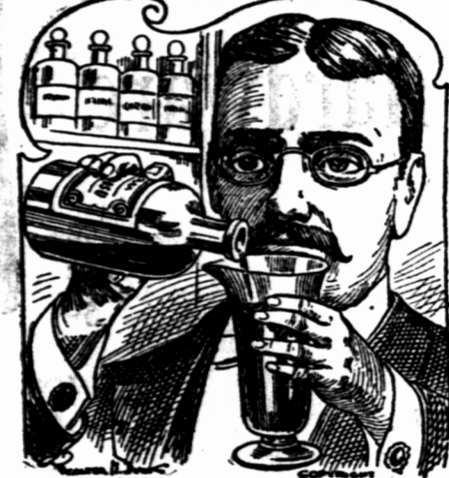

This is the fleet that dealers have been waiting for. It is likely that the price of potatoes will take a drop. Six other schooners are new on the way from P. E. Island to this port. Halifax Herald.

BUSINESS BOOMING AT VICTORIA.—Last Friday and Saturday were two of the busiest days seen in Victoria for a long time. The firm of Wright Bros. alone bought off the streets and shipped on board schooners in the two days over seven thousand bushels of potatoes and oats, besides taking in 25 tons of pressed hay. McLean & Came on also took in a large quantity, and the two pork buyers for Davis & Fraser, C. C. McIntosh & Son and Ewen McKinnon paid the farmers seven hundred dollars for pork.

On the eve of his departure from De Wolfe, N. E., where he has labored for the past two summers to return to Pine Hill, Halifax, R. Hensley Stavert, Wilmot, P. E. I., was presented with an address and dress suit case by those among whom he has labored. The St. Croix, N. B. Courier has the following account:—On Sunday evening, November 1st, R. Hensley Stavert, B. A., preached his farewell sermon to a large and appreciative congregation. Mr. Stavert has been with us two summers and by his kindly manner, and ability as a preacher, has won the affections of his people. He has been a most zealous worker. Since his coming here, in May, 1902, twenty-four have been received into full communion in the Presbyterian church and eighteen children baptized. Through his perseverance Tower Hill has been added to this field and we are to be an ordained mission field. Mr. Stavert's expenses have been all paid in full, besides quite a large amount given to home and foreign missions. Very much regret was expressed at his departure, and as a mark of the esteem in which he is held, he was presented with a dress suit case accompanied by the following address:—

DEAR MR. STAVERT: We, the members of your congregation, beg you to accept this dress suit case as a small token of esteem and love with which you are held among your people in this section of the field. It seems only a short time since we met as strangers, and now the time has almost come when we must say "Good Bye." Before we separate we would assure you of our sincere personal friend, ship and deep interest in your welfare and pray that you may prosper in every good work. May God give you courage for every conflict, patience for every trial, and strength for every duty. And may you find the school year, upon which you are entering, the richest in experience and happiest in Christian service you have yet known. This is the wish of your many friends in Baillie, De Wolfe, Lyndfield and Oak Hill.

MT. ALLISON NOTES.—Great excitement prevailed here last Saturday on account of the foot-ball match with Acadia. Everything pointed to a victory for Acadia. Mt. Allison had been beaten during this season by U. N. B. and St. John. When the game came off, 250 people were there as spectators. The game hardly commenced when Biveton made a touch down for Mt. Allison. This immediately changed the complexion of affairs. It began to look as though the visitors would have to work. The fight went stubbornly on. Mt. Allison's half line outplayed with astonishing ease the half backs of their opponents. The Mt. Allison scrim heeled the ball back with such surprising rapidity that their opponents seldomly if ever controlled it. Sometimes the visiting team would do good dribbling only to lose the gained ground in a few moments. Once, one of their men broke loose with the ball and dribbled it over the Mt. Allison line, the Mt. Allison full back having slipped on the ice as the ball came toward him down the field. During the last half the ball was within 5 yds of the Acadia line for the most of the time. The score 3-3 did not really represent the merits of the two teams, as may be judged by the refusal of the Acadia Captain to play the game till one or the other won. U. N. B. now stands highest in the intercollegiate foot-ball league but the foot-ball cup may not be awarded this year.
