The Patriot tells us that Hon. Mr. Fielding is "a tower of strength to the Liberal Government by reason of his able handling of perplexing questions," and predicts that "his coming will be attended with beneficial results." The Liberal organ also "understands that the site of the new railway station may be determined on" during the Minister's visit. We trust that this may prove true, always with the understanding that the station shall be located where the people want it. We believe the majority would much prefer to delay for the time the building of a new station rather than have it placed at other than a central and convenient location.

Mr. Fielding, now Finance Minister, and who it is said will soon lead the Opposition in the Parliament of Canada has a number of relatives on the Island besides many warm friends. Mr. Fielding's father and the father of John P. Fielding Albertson were brothers. Mr. Fielding is a cousin of Mrs. Simon Dodd and J. K. Ross of this city. Mrs. Howard of North River, Mrs. Hugh McMillan New Haven, Mrs. Joe Stretch Long Creek, through his mother's side of the house, and he is also related to Mrs. James Carter and Leslie Cook through the Fieldings.

Editor Cotton is too modest by half. Otherwise he might have claimed relationship with our distinguished visitor for himself, he being as we are informed, a cousin of Joseph Stretch of Long Creek.

There is no possible way of misunderstanding the wishes of the people of Charlottetown and the patrons of the railway with regard to the location of the new railway station. A site on George Street if not on Queen Street is what is wanted. Of this fact the Government has been made aware by our representatives and by resolutions adopted at public meetings. Other interests are endeavoring secretly and by underhand methods to thwart the people's will in this matter. We know full well the influences that are at work to secure a more eastern location. Two or three more or less influential persons having property, or options to purchase property, would profit by such a location. The public interest and the convenience of travellers and patrons of the Railway, will be best served by a location on George Street, or further west. The matter ought to be settled at once definitely and it will be best for the Government as well as for the people to have it settled rightly.

Last winter and in previous winters there was a constant playing at cross purposes between the Departments of Marine, Railways and the Post Office to the serious detriment of the winter service to and from the mainland. Government railway trains would not connect with the Government steamers, the Post Office Department could not get special trains to carry the mails without paying for them to the Railway Department, and for this there was no appreciation. So the mails were delayed, private citizens in some cases, paid for mail trains, and in many cases passengers were required to pay for special trains to carry them from the steamers to their homes. The management was chaotic. The trouble involved constant telegraphing to one or other of the three departments at Ottawa, but the tangle lasted through the winter. There grew up at last a strong demand for local and centralized control of the three services, but, as usual, nothing was done. Is it too much to ask that Mr. Fielding will take this matter in hand and have our winter service put on a reliable and business-like basis? That we have not overstated the facts the Minister can learn by inquiry from any intelligent citizen.

We believe that Hon. Mr. Fielding is actuated by friendly motives toward the Island and would like to do what he can to help us. We believe also, that he can do much, if he will and if he makes himself thoroughly acquainted with our requirements and just grievances. One of these is that we are paying double, and in some cases more than double the rates which the people on the mainland pay for telegraph messages. And even when paying double rates we have no night service, the communication by wire being confined to twelve hours out of the twenty-four. This condition exists by the default or neglect of the federal Government, which by the terms of union pays the subsidy to the Telegraph Company and is responsible for our telegraph service. During the entire term of the Liberal Government at Ottawa this matter has been urged upon their attention by our representatives, by resolutions of our Boards of Trade, by the Maritime Board of Trade, by the press and by our business men. And yet, strange to say nothing has been done, not a dollar expended, toward improving the service or lessening the charges. The grievance has become intolerable to our people. It is most discreditable to the Government and if not remedied at once it must prove a serious, if not fatal handicap to every Liberal candidate on the Island. These are plain, but not unfriendly words.
