A valued reader of this paper writes us from Dorchester, N.B., enclosing a page from the Toronto Star Weekly of August 24th with a very interesting article entitled, "Trotting Horses Never Die."

We almost hate to correct the writer of "Trotting Horses Never Die" because such publicity is very helpful to the sport we all love so well, but in the interests of accuracy we guess we will have to put him right.

\$2000 had been posted by the Fredericton track management for another break in the track record of 2:04 1/2 made by Gustav and that amount was paid over to Sullivan and Mahwinney of Machias, Maine, owners of Walter Dale. He was driven by the diminutive Henry Clukey.

On July 25th, 1939, Billy Direct, bay horse by Napoleon Direct, was brought from the United States to Fredericton, Ontario, by his driver V. J. Fleming, a native son of Dundas, Ont., with the advertised purpose to beat the Canadian pacing record of 2:02 1/2 (made by Walter Dale at Fredericton) by Direct.

Not only has Walter Dale paced a faster mile than Lastic Grattan—2:02 1/2—but as stated before so has Battle Axe—2:03 1/2—and the Ontario pacer Simcoe Harvest—2:04 3/4 and 2:04 1/4 in a winning race at Quebec City, Que., September 8th, 1938.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club will be held in the Blue Room at Milton's Old Spain, Charlottetown, on Tuesday the 8th day of October at eight pm. Interested horsemen are invited to attend. At its conclusion a banquet will be held.

Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. S. Thane Belyea, Charlottetown, N.B., from whom a very neat and appropriate card was received announcing the arrival of Richard

Montague on August 31st, 1940, because of August 31st, 1940, the paragraph which friend in Dorchester takes exception to is as follows: "At the Kingston, Ontario, track the great horse Toll Gate had established a record time of 2:04 1/2. Lastic Grattan went out and smashed it easily with 2:04 3/4, which still stands as the mile record on any Canadian track."

When High Pat paced in two minutes recently he became the 70th pacer in all history to do the trick.

Henry Clukey, Rockland, Maine, is opening a public stable and advertising in track and race horses. He has proven himself a clever fitter and smart manager of campaigners and one of the headiest reinsmen in New England.

Danbury Fair, Danbury, Conn., will have racing October 6th to 12th. It is one of the oldest meetings in the east and its generous purses draw tremendous fields of horses, many of them that have raced on the Grand Circuit. It is a real old time fair too, with big entry lists of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, vegetables and grains. Between the heats of the harness horse races there is always a splendid vaudeville program so in that way it differs very little from our own Provincial Exhibition; but there is one very big thing about Danbury which we did not know until Old Home Week and that is that they don't have any evening performances as the stage and Grand Stand are not wired for lighting.

The hundred mile an hour gale and storm played havoc with the Truro Speedway and notwithstanding heroic efforts made to get it ready in time for the race Wednesday afternoon quite a few horse owners did not consider it in good enough condition to start their entries. In order not to disappoint the public a match race and two class races were made up. In one June Evans 2:10 1/4 again headed Hal Britton 2:08 3/4 to the victor in 2:16. In the race between the Baker, 2:06 3/4 and Vesta Bars 2:05 1/2, the Baker proved the best and in the third heat Major Boves 2:12 1/2 was an awkward starter. The finish between these two pacers was very close and the time—2:13 1/4—excellent for the condition of the track.

The ex-Newfoundland trotter Harvest Melody 2:10 1/2 is now New Glasgow ownership, headed Brian Yerke 2:14 3/4 and Direct L. 2:09 1/2 in two heats to win the race. Direct L. came through the third heat and noosed out Harvest Melody.

Victorious Hal, a two-year-old by Direct Dale, made Nell Cochato by Walter Cochato, was second in the Frank P. Fox Stakes for two-year-old pacers raced at Indianapolis, Indiana, September 4th, winning the second heat and taking a record of 2:03 1/4. He is a full brother to Nell Cochato (9) 2:16, now a four-year-old owned by Willard Kelly, Southport. Victorious Hal was the highest priced two-year-old pacer sold at auction in 1939.

Dr. Baker, brown gelding by Volcanite, has won every race he started in this season—15—but had a close call at Elkview, Wisconsin, recently when he made a break on the first turn and finished second. He topped the next two heats from a fast field in 2:07 and 2:09 1/4. Dr. Baker and Fearless Peter are both undefeated so far this season.

We note where Merry Bars, roan mare by Grattan Bars, that made the trip to P. E. I., a week late for the Exhibition races a few years ago, won the 2:13 pace at Detroit, Michigan, September 2nd, stepping the second heat in 2:05 1/2. It is a mile track.

Three-heat Racing Record Established

DELAWARE, O., Sept. 20.—(AP) William Cash, bay colt owned by L. C. S. S. of Minneapolis, Minn., bettered the world's three-heat racing record for three-year-olds on a half-mile track in the Grand Circuit's closing program here today.

Piloted by Walter Brittenfield of Springfield, Ill., William Cash turned in a cumulative mark of 6:11 1/4 in the \$2,500 Allen Hotel Purse event to shave 3 1/4 seconds off the record set in 1927 by Dr. Grattan, bay gelding, driven by D. Miller.

William Cash won the first and third heats in 2:03 1/4 and 2:03, respectively. Fearless Peter, guided by the veteran Hugh M. (Doc) Parshall of Urbana, O., won the second heat in 2:05 1/2, but the victory did not detract from the Sprague colt's honors.

Many of our race fans will remember Eula H. 2:06 1/4 that Billy Keys drove to a new track record of 2:08 1/4 at Charlottetown in 1931. She was represented at the races this season by a two-year-old, Volo H., by Volomite 2:03 1/4, that won the two-year-old pace at Rutland, Vermont, September 3rd, time 2:23, 2:20 1/4. She is owned and was driven by Wendell Wathan of Fort Fairfield, Maine. The same afternoon Wendall won the 2:15 pace with Guy Dale, best time 2:13 3/4.

Calumet Coburn 2:10 is back on the trot again and won the 2:14 trot at Lewiston, Maine, best time 2:12 1/4. The next afternoon Happy L. 2:06 1/4 by Bill L. 2:16 1/2, full brother of Aaron L. 2:07 1/4 and Direct L. 2:09 1/2, won the 2:06 D pace, time 2:07, 2:11. The third heat was a dead heat with Volo Hedgewood, time 2:08 1/2.

The first direct descendant of The Harvester 2:01 that Ed Geers drove to the world's stallion record, to enter the Two Minute List and Pat record taken at Indianapolis, Indiana, on Labor Day. His sire is Pat Harvester 2:09 1/4, son of The Harvester and the ex-queen of pacers Miss Harris, M. 1:58 1/4 by Peter the Great. Knob Mary 2:08 1/4 (trotting) by The Exponent 2:11 3/4, son of Bingen, High Knob Mary is a full sister of High Knob Beauty 2:08 3/4, raced through the Maritimes some twenty years ago.

Score Five Runs In Eighth Inning To Eke Out 6-5 Victory

DETROIT, Sept. 20.—(AP)— Detroit Tigers went on a five-run rampage in the eighth inning today to beat out Cleveland Indians 6-5 in the first game of their crucial series and take a one-game lead in the American League.

In the wildest baseball spectacle Detroit has seen since the World Series days of 1934 and 1935, the Tigers today nosed out Cleveland Indians 6-5 in the opening battle of the three-game series for American League supremacy.

By the victory Detroit took a one-game lead over Cleveland in the league pennant race.

For seven innings Detroit had seemed a hopelessly beaten team. Mel Harder, 30-year-old Cleveland right-hander, had led the Tigers to three hits and a single run and was riding along on a comfortable 4-1 lead.

Then Detroit struck. Before the eighth inning was over the Tigers had scored five runs, chased Harder and Bobby Feller, who was charged with the loss, and sewed up the ball game.

Fans Go Wild

Play was halted repeatedly in the eighth inning while ground-keepers removed from the field straw bales and debris thrown by enthusiastic members of the crowd of 22,508.

The Tigers were out-hit 15-9 but the Indians, as panicky as they were when they lost three straight games here earlier in the month, kicked in with four errors.

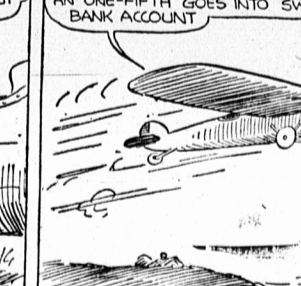
