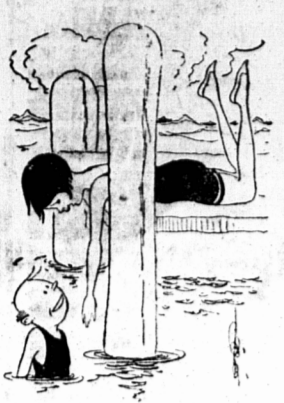

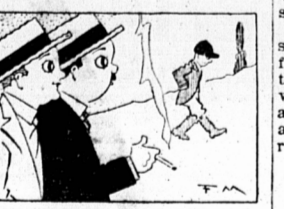

SENSATIONAL MURDER CASE BEFORE COURT

Former Officer of Dragoon Guards is Charged With Killing J. T. Derham.

CANTERBURY, Eng. Sept. 7.—A triangle case with sensational features was unfolded by the Prosecuting Attorney today in the arraignment of Alphonse F. A. Smith on a charge of murdering John Thomas Derham, at Smith's villa, Stella Maris, Whitstable. Smith, a grandson of the late Hugh Ryan, of Canadian Pacific Building fame, is a former officer of the Dragoon Guards and is a wealthy man, Derham, who was killed August 12th, came of a well known British family.

Men Were Friends

The pretty young wife sat in court not far from the dead man's aged father, as Selton Cohen, the Crown Prosecutor, outlined his case. Smith, smartly dressed followed the proceedings with great alertness from the dock. Mr. Cohen indicated that the two men were friends of the same age and both of independent means. Both had been educated at Eton, and later at Cambridge, where they were great friends. Derham was married but lived apart from his wife. He became a frequent visitor at Smith's villa, and Smith appeared to have become acutely jealous of his friend's association with his wife. On one occasion, said the Prosecutor, Smith found a letter which his wife said she had received from Derham and he flew into such a rage that he tore her picture from the wall.

Continuing, Mr. Cohen said a maid was present on the occasion of that outburst and she reports Smith in his rage cried out "do you think I am going to let another man take my wife? No I will kill them both. I don't care if I am arrested."

Trapped By Telegram

The Prosecutor also read a letter which he said Smith had written to his wife one phrase of which was "my dear girl, the problem can be solved in one way, removal of your lover, Derham, or myself." "With the characteristic cowardice which that individual has shown throughout your mean and sordid intrigue he has removed himself from his room fearing, I presume, consequences of a visit from me. His pursuit of you was and is despicable and a damnable thing. The whole thing is too disgusting for me." Mr. Cohen declared that on the day of the shooting, a telegram in Smith's handwriting was handed to the Whitstable office, addressed to Derham in London and signed "Kathleen," presumably Smith's wife. This telegram read: "Will you see me for a few hours tonight? Most urgent. Wire General Post Office, Whitstable, not home."

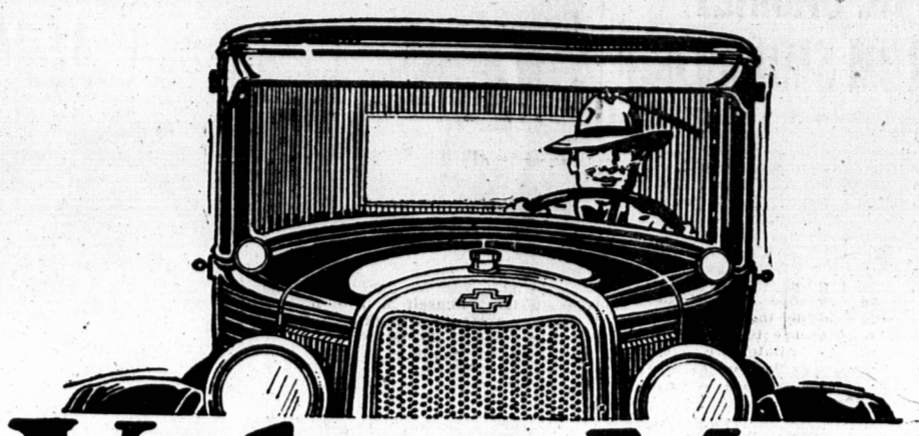
Derham went to Smith's villa and signed the telegram. When he returned home, he found his wife and sister Lillian White, it would appear an altercation broke out among the three in the drawing room.

The Fatal Fight

Despite this, the three went out to a hotel for dinner. Afterwards they returned to Stella Maris where a bed had been prepared for Derham. Miss White testified according to the Prosecutor, that she heard Smith say to his wife, "I won't have this other lover of yours sleeping in the house." A little later Miss White heard a bang, and, running down stairs, saw Smith lying on the floor with Derham sitting on him and striking him on the head and shoulder with some object. Mrs. Smith was trying to pull Derham from her husband, and finally succeeded. The Crown Prosecutor, said another witness, passing the house at about this time, heard the report of a revolver. Smith's letter to his wife was not delivered to her, the Prosecutor said, but the defendant handed it to the police unopened when he was arrested. The full text indicated that he intended suicide instead of shooting Derham. When he handed the letter to the officers, he said: "I intended to shoot myself, but in the struggle for the revolver, it went off and shot Derham."

Improving the Bacon

(Special to The Guardian.)

MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—More than 3,000 boys and girls, members of swine clubs in eight provinces of the Dominion, are now busily engaged in raising high grade bacon hogs, and as a result of their work several times the number of choice hogs will find their way to a ready and profitable market.

A survey of these clubs and their undertaking has been taken by officials of the Department of Colonization, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Canadian National Railways, along the lines of that system in all the provinces with the exception of British Columbia, to obtain information relative to the annual competition for the W. D. Robb Challenge Cup, a trophy presented by the Vice-President for the purpose of encouraging boys and girls in developing the swine industry.

The organization of these boys and girls swine clubs was undertaken by the Canadian National Railways three years ago, and is working in close harmony with the provincial governments. Much progress has been accomplished as a result of the formation of these clubs. A great deal of useful information regarding proper type swine has been spread throughout Canada and the necessity of adopting a definite policy of production is being realized. Each year has seen progress and a marked improvement in the general quality of hogs marketed.

The provincial departments of agriculture hold competitions in judging car lots and the two representative of the successful club in each province then become eligible for the Robb Cup competition. This event will take place during the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto, where the sixteen provincial winners will meet in competition for the Canadian championship. The first contest of this character resulted in the cup going to Vegreville, Alberta, and last year two boys from Komoka, Ontario, were the winners, closely preceded by a team of girls from Nova Scotia.

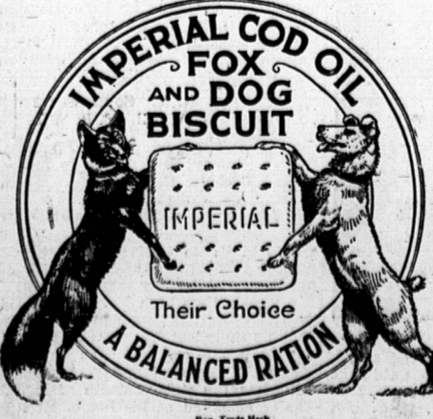
