OTTAWA, June 24—Prorogation of Parliament at the end of next week appears to be gaining ground among members, although some declare their intention to continue the fight on for some weeks yet. Conservatives meet in caucus tomorrow morning to discuss the remaining seasonal programme, and it is likely that then there will be discussion of an approximate date for the end of the session. Re-distribution is the most contentious of the public measures yet to come before the House. At most since the beginning of session, redistribution has been before a special committee with Ontario constituencies as the stumbling block. On the Ontario constituencies, it is doubtful if a full agreement between Liberals and Conservatives will be reached and there is talk of sending the bill over for still another session.

MATHIESON'S ADDRESS

At the morning session His Lordship addressed the Grand Jury as follows:

"The amount of business that will come before you, gentlemen, I regret to say, is larger than usual and it is of such a character, in the criminal cases, as will require your utmost care and consideration. As you may observe, your numbers are only one half of the number of the Grand Jurors formerly summoned. I trust you will find that in your deliberations it may be more convenient and more satisfactory to have those considerations that come before you discussed by a smaller number than by a number so large as twenty-four. At any rate the responsibility which each one of you will bear will be proportionately greater, and we will hope, not only that you will give to the consideration of these grave matters all the attention they deserve, but that the sheriffs for the time being of the different Counties will exercise the greatest possible care—will continue to exercise the greatest possible care—in selecting for the Grand Inquest of the Counties the twelve men within the County who are most suitable by reason of location and fitness to occupy such an important position.

Now there come before you for consideration four bills of indictment. The first is the King against Frederick Kenny, which is a bill of indictment for shop breaking and larceny. It will be for you, upon the evidence that comes before you to determine whether or not a true bill should be found.

The next case is that of the King against Russell Gay, an indictment for breaking and entering a fox ranch and stealing a number of foxes. The breaking and entering of a fox ranch is just the same as the breaking and entering of your warehouse or store and the law provides the same security, and the same penalty for breaking into and stealing from one as the other. Though they are animals that are wild by nature, when they are retained in captivity and are kept as those foxes are alleged to have been kept, they are just as much a subject of theft as your horse or cow that stands in your stable. You in coming to your decision will remember this in regard to this case and in all the others which you will have to consider, that you are not a jury in a case. You are a jury to determine whether or not the evidence produced before you the accused should be sent down for trial to the Petit Jury. You only hear one side and when you have heard that side you must upon your oaths come to a conclusion and find accordingly, whether this is a case in which a true bill should be found, which will involve the sending of the person accused to his trial before the Petit Jury, and before the Petit Jury all that he has to say in his

defense, all the witnesses he wishes to summon, will be brought and heard; but your duty is fully performed when you have decided whether or not in this particular case, any other case, is one that should be tried.

There are two other cases that I am sure will give you gentlemen far more concern by reason of the terrible character of the offence which is charged, and of the special circumstances surrounding the poor unfortunates who are accused of having committed these offences.

There is the case of the King against Winnifred Crabbe. In that case the bill of indictment contains two counts—only a difference of way of stating what is practically the one offence. The law requires however certain aspects or points of view, in which a single offence may be regarded in different ways, so that it often is necessary for the Attorney General to put in a number of counts, all aimed at practically the same course of events. These two counts are of this nature. The first count has to do with failing to procure proper assistance in child birth.

The other case, against Mary Berigan, contains one count only, and that count is the same as in the first count, of the charge against the Crabbe girl.

Those are the four criminal cases to come before you. It will be your duty also to visit the Asylum and the Poor-house, or Infirmary and the Jail. I see that there are some eight prisoners in Jail. The visit of the Grand Jury from time to time to the public institutions of this Province should always be taken, and have for the most part been taken with the utmost seriousness.

And now that the Grand Jury is reduced in numbers I think, gentlemen, that you will find you will be able to work perhaps with more efficiency in inspecting those different institutions. At any rate see to it in this, that you do not overlook such inspection and such examination as you are in duty bound to carry through in the interests of all the people of this County. I think you will find that the people of this County, those who have friends and relatives there and all people of sympathetic minds, to see that those institutions in which are housed and cared for the helpless ones of our race, are not allowed to fall into neglect and that the inmates of these institutions should be kept as they should be kept, as bearable as the inflictions under which they labor will permit. The duty is upon you, gentlemen, particularly in regard to the Asylum.

Tribute to Late Sir Louis Davies

His Lordship then commented upon the death of Sir Louis Davies and reviewed his brilliant career. He said: "It is fit that at this assembling of the Grand Inquest of Queens County some expression should be given to the sorrow we all feel on the death of Sir Louis Davies.

It is now forty-two years since that he was elected to represent this county in the Parliament of Canada. For nineteen years as a private member and as a minister of the Crown he continued to be your chosen representative. In this Court he naturally appeals to us more as a jurist than as a statesman and we realize that in his career his legal training served to illuminate the wider field of statesmanship and was indispensable to the success which he achieved. Fifty eight years ago tomorrow Sir Louis Davies signed the Parchment Roll of Attorneys of this Court.

Always he marched forth to meet opportunity. It was by no series of accidents that in succession he became a member of this Legislature, leader of the Opposition, Premier and Attorney General of the Federal House, Maritime leader of his party, Minister of the Crown, Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, Chief Justice of that Court, a member of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, Deputy Governor General, Administrator of the Government of Canada and thus had traversed in little more than the half century the whole journey from junior member of the bar, to the highest position to which a Canadian can aspire.

With a high sense of public duty and a man who won such eminence and distinction he had in him the elements of greatness which enabled him to fill worthily every position to which he attained.

This Island has produced men eminent as jurists and statesmen of great worth but it has produced no man who won such eminence in both fields as did Sir Louis H. Davies and none who more sincerely loved and served his native land.

We owe it to ourselves as a people to pay this tribute to his memory.

Other Tributes.

Mr. Justice Hazard paid a glowing tribute to the character of the late Chief Justice of Canada, whom he had known as a member of the bar in this Province for many years, having had the closest relations with him in the legal profession throughout his life. There was no man he had ever met, in business or elsewhere, who so conscientiously held at heart the interests of the people he came in contact with in his work.

When Louis Davies took hold of a case in Court every thing that was in him was interested in that case. Indeed, his regulation was that he had been in the middle of a case for many years, having had the closest relations with him in the legal profession throughout his life. There was no man he had ever met, in business or elsewhere, who so conscientiously held at heart the interests of the people he came in contact with in his work.

There were many things Mr. Justice Hazard could refer to, he said, in the life of Sir Louis Davies and if he were writing a memorial it would no doubt be interesting reading but he did not wish to go into them at the present time. He wished simply to express his feeling in the death of Sir Louis Davies that Canada has lost one of her foremost statesmen and men of high character. As has been said, he attained the highest position in the land, and while he has never occupied the position of Governor General, yet he has filled that exalted position as deputy to the Governor General on many occasions. So there was no further rung of the ladder to climb. When death came there was nothing in which he had not succeeded, as a representative of the people, as a member of the bar of Canada, and as a Judge of the highest Court in the land.

"We all, I think, will remember the many expressions we have heard of his success as a representative of this County. He was one of the men who was always looked forward to when political contests came and he expressed himself in no undecided terms; and in his place, either in politics, or business, professionally or otherwise, I know of no person who ever attained and held the offices he did with the same satisfaction to the people of this Province. We have much to regret in his death and I have no doubt that every party in this Province will regret
