ISLANDER WOUNDED.—Word has been received that Private Robert Trainor of Charlottetown, formerly of the 16th Battalion Canadian Scottish, but now of a French Mortar Brigade has been admitted to No. 1 Stationary hospital at Etaples, wounded by shrapnel in leg. He was gassed and wounded at Ypres last year.

Three bodies, those of Sarah Lund, J. M. Shreenan and Edith McKenna are also awaiting transportation, and thirty-three cars of freight.
