Sir Gilbert Parker, the celebrated Canadian novelist, contributes a political article to the May number of The Canadian Magazine, under the title "The Land for the People." It is an account of a proposal to solve the land question in Britain. The Arctic Host and Hostess is the title of a well illustrated article in the same number by Agnes Deans Cameron, author of The New North. In this article Miss Cameron relates some of her experiences as the guest of Eskimos in the Far North. Mrs Jean Blewett has an appreciation of Doctor Torrington, the great Toronto organist and choir-master, and there is a splendid article by Clayton M. Jones, entitled The Great Silent Force in Canadian Development. The Spirit of the Dance, by Mazo de la Roche, and The Twelve Apostles, by St Clair Moore, are two excellent short stories. There are other interesting things in the number.

The "Two Macs" show window on Great George St. is certainly attracting a lot of attention. There is on display an immense diagram showing the position of the Comet daily. It shows the position as it speeds on to meet the earth. The diagram shows Mars, Venus and the earth travelling on their orbits and marks distinctly the location of each of the aforementioned heavenly bodies as they travel through space. It gives the exact location of the Comet daily since Nov 1st and until Juiv 1st, when it will become indistinguishable to the naked eye. It also gives the exact position of the bodies on May 18th when the Comet's tail, about 15,000,000 miles in length will sweep across the earth and may display a considerable number of shooting stars, and interest will, no doubt be centred daily on this window. It may be interesting to know that the comet travels 40 miles a second, and at that rate of speed it will take until May 18th before it will reach its nearest point to the earth. While no trouble at all is anticipated the exact location daily will prove interesting to the average observer. The diagram is pronounced by astronomers as a correct plan of the bodies. The "Two Macs" are to be commended upon their enterprise in procuring this diagram, and their show windows will certainly be the centre of attraction. The comet will not appear again until 1985.
