BANKS IN CANADA.—The two bank amalgamations which took place during the year 1918 reduced the number of Canadian Chartered Banks to nineteen. At the end of October there were 3,217 bank branches in Canada. These were distributed among the Provinces as follows: Ontario, 1,138; Quebec, 686; Nova Scotia, 117; New Brunswick, 79; Prince Edward Island, 18; British Columbia, 173; Manitoba, 204; Saskatchewan, 415; Alberta, 268; Yukon 4. The remainder were in the United States, England and other countries.—Monetary Times.
