Reports were received and adopted from the following committees. W. A. Stewart presented the financial report; Dr. Archibald read the Educational Department report; W. M. Rowe reported for the Foreign Work; P. W. Turner presented the Physical Department report in the absence of its chairman J. A. McMillan; Mr. W. E. Bentley reported for the Religious Work and Camp Committee.

Business of importance was discussed by the Board pertaining to finances and a real endeavor must be made to redeem all outstanding pledges.

Mr. W. E. Bentley was appointed a member of the National Council to represent our Association at the annual meeting in London, Ont., early in February.

Meeting adjourned with prayer by Dr. Archibald.

Following is the report of the General Secretary for the month of November, 1928, submitted at the monthly meeting of the Y. M. C. A.

To the President and Board of Directors. It is with great pleasure that I bring before you our report for November.

The month has been a busy one, and if forecasts prove correct, we should have the best season yet.

General Activities and Attendance. I am pleased to state that most of the standing committees have been formed, and several have already had meetings.

Our full winter program is now in operation, and the newly formed committees are giving real service in helping to carry out a large program.

Attendance at the various features have been most encouraging. Gym classes, bowling and special activities have been well up to the mark.

Student Work. As usual, the students met each Saturday night for their regular social and get-together; all meetings came off very successfully.

Boys' Work. Mr. Murray is fast getting the boys in hand, and work in that department is going along nicely.

The annual Halloween supper and social was staged November 2nd and was attended by fifty boys, who enjoyed a hearty bean supper, followed by the usual games and contests.

Week of Prayer. The Y. M. C. A. Week of Prayer was held the world over November 11 to 17. It was observed in Charlottetown by opening of our Boys' Service and our regular Sunday evening services, and by a special meeting.

Boys' Sunday Morning Services. Our services for boys opened on the 11th, under the leadership of Mr. Murray, with 13 boys attending.

Sunday Evening Services. Our services opened on Nov. 18th with Dr. Zella Clark as our speaker. Dr. Clark gave a most interesting and helpful address on India. Attendance 340.

On Nov. 25th, Mr. W. E. Bentley spoke of "Failure." Mr. Bentley brought out in his address the causes of failure and a plea to the students to get started right by keeping close to God. 330 attended this meeting.

Foreign Work. We were favoured with a visit from Capt. J. A. Brace, late of China, who is now home on furlough and acting as Secretary of Student Missions.

The Real Story. The story of Nurse Cavell's trial, sentence and death was told last night in London by Maitre de Leval, who defended her.

Maitre Leval spoke at an Armistice celebration dinner at the Authors' Club, Whitehallcourt, at which he and Viscount Peel, the Secretary for India, were the chief guests.

"I have heard some people even in England," said Maitre de Leval, "say that she was rightly killed because she was a spy. She was not.

"Even the Germans never said that she was. In all the statements made in the indictment against her there was in each case only one charge, 'Procuring soldiers to the enemy.'"

All that she wanted to do was to save soldiers from death, and she declared before the Court. "I acknowledge that through my intervention 200 men have been led up to the frontier."

"Nurse Cavell," he continued, "died on October 12, not as some people have said, by collapsing at the execution post and being shot by a German officer. She died courageously as heroically as a soldier."—London Daily Chronicle.

ENGLAND TO MAKE TALKIES. By use of a new sound-producing device, super talking pictures of feature length are to be made in

England. The apparatus, the invention of an Englishman, was recently tested in London in producing a prologue to an American feature picture, and at Wembley Stadium, where it was used in musical productions and for announcements of results. It is said to give loud reproductions without a trace of harshness, jarring or blurred notes.

ALL-IRISH FILMS PLANNED. Super films with Irish authors, actors and producers are to be produced in Northern Ireland by a company now being formed. It is planned to secure film rights of novels and plays written by famous Irish-born authors and the services of actors working with such organizations as the Ulster Players, the Northern Drama League, and the Randalstown Players. The Irish producer mentioned as being interested has had experience in Hollywood and Germany.
