**THE NEW HOCKEY RULES**

The C. A. H. A. rules under which the Maritime League are playing this season, do not differ greatly from the M. A. H. A. of last season. They require that all players are to be numbered with conspicuous figures.

There shall be only one referee for a match, except when the executive appoints an assistant referee.

Each captain must wear a 4 inch armband, distinctive in color, marked with the letter C.

Only two substitutes are allowed, outside a substitute goal-keeper and any substitution of the latter can only be made at the end of a period except in case of an injury.

Should a player be injured or break a skate, his slide shall immediately put on a substitute.

Deliberate making of off-side plays shall be penalized as a foul.

A player on the defending side is not to be considered off-side within a space of 60 feet from his own goal, marked by a line drawn across the rink.

Only body-checking is allowed by players of defending team back of the 60-foot line.
