to the midrib, short, indusia straight curved, or in part horseshoe-shaped. A common and variable plant of the moist woods. **Lady Fern—Asplenium Filix-foemina** (L.) Bernh.  
(2) Sori roundish.  
(3) Fronds lanceolate, widest in the middle, once pinnate, 1-3 ft high, lower pinnae much reduced; pinnae lanceolate, pinnatifid. The lowest two or more pairs deflexed.

Sori separate, near the margin; indusia reniform or orbicular with a narrow sinus by which it is attached to the frond. **New York Shield Fern—Aspidium noveboracense** (L.) A. Gray.  
(10) Fronds oblong-lanceolate, scarcely narrower at the base, once pinnate, 1-3 ft. high; pinnae linear-lanceolate, deeply pinnatifid; sori crowded 10 to 12 on each segment, indusia minute, reniform, sometimes glandular. **Marsh Shield Fern—Aspidium Thelypteris** (L.) Sw.
