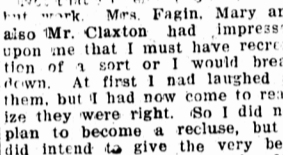
PLANS THAT WILL LEAD TO SUCCESS.

Fox Exhibition in Montreal

An enthusiastic meeting of fox fanciers was held in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside on Tuesday afternoon, September 14th, a. w. I was present Mr. James White (of the Conservation Commission of Acadia) and Mr. J. W. Callbeck, Edgar Milligan, Fred L. Rogers, Peter G. Clark and B. Graham Rogers. The Dominion Government has made a grant of \$2,000 towards the expenses of a live fox exhibition to be held in Montreal on November 24th, 25th and 26th, and the Provincial Government has also made a grant. Committees were appointed to carry out the work in connection with the exhibition, and the classification committee consists of Messrs. McLure, J. B. Rombough, J. W. Callbeck, Edgar Milligan, Fred L. Rogers, Peter G. Clark and B. Graham Rogers. The General Committee consists of Leith Peck, Walter Grant, J. Graham Rogers, Major D. A. McKinnon, J. LeRoy Holman, B. Graham Rogers, Shelton Sharp, George Brown, Fred L. Rogers, Mr. Fred L. Rogers is chairman of the Classification Committee, and Mr. J. Stanley Wedlock chairman of the General Committee. Mr. B. Graham Rogers was appointed Secretary of both committees. As soon as the various details in connection with the exhibition are finally arranged full publicity will be given. A number of cups and trophies have been given by the fur dealers of Montreal and other parts of Canada, and there is no question but that this exhibition in Montreal will give the fox industry a great deal of exceedingly valuable publicity, and the ranchers of the Island are deeply grateful to the Dominion Government and Commission of Conservation for the interest they have taken in this matter.

How to Make Coffee

Allow one heaping tablespoonful of Seal Brand Coffee to each cup. Pour fresh, boiling water over the coffee. Simmer 5 minutes. Let stand a few minutes. Then serve. Be sure you use rich, full-bodied coffee.

OBSTRUCTED RADIATOR

H. W. S. writes: I can run my car only about four miles before the water boils and the radiator steams. Sometime ago, a little bran was put into my radiator (honey-comb type), to stop a leak. Can this have caused the trouble? What can I use to dissolve this without injuring the radiator. It seems as if the pump pumps water faster than it can circulate. Answer: Quite likely the bran has stopped up a portion of the water passages. You might try a strong solution of washing soda (sodium carbonate, sal soda), filling the water system and letting it remain there for a few hours, while the car is in use and then drawing it off. A solution of lye or potash can be used safely, if this does not restore the circulation. If parts of the radiator do not get hot as soon as others, when the engine is first started, it is a pretty sure sign that the circulation is clogged in places. Are you sure that your rubber water-connections, at the full diameter inside of the radiator, are tight enough so that the fan turns at full speed. The belt tension should be such that the fan requires appreciable force to move it by hand, when the engine is stopped.

LEAKY REAR-AXLE

R. S. T. writes: My Ford persistently leaks grease at the right hand rear wheel. In spite of repeated renewals of felt washers, but the other side does not give this trouble. Does this indicate something wrong with the differential or worn out parts? Can you suggest a remedy? Answer: There is no reason to think that anything is wrong. It is the right side that usually gives trouble, because the right wheel is almost always lower than the left, when being driven on the right hand side of a crowned road. You might have one of the special compounds which cling to the gear surfaces, in your rear axle housing. A thin coat, drilled upward through the axle, will reach the gear teeth, and to let excess grease escape before it reaches the wheel. Some people pour a small hole upward through the drive-shaft housing, to get rid of oil that may enter the axle housing along the drive shaft and raise the level unduly. Your axle is carrying the load in the axle-housing too high, are you?

There are attributes of human nature that we often fail to take account of. Its little imp of perversity that lurks in the heart of most of us, ready to be called into activity by some command or prohibition. We may be really willing to do or not do, but the instant some-one voices authority over us, then we at once become contrary.

If we are wives and mothers and co-workers would only remember this, realizing that others feel the same as we did, we might have less of friction in our associations. The thing may be necessary of a compromise, but there is always a tactful way of suggesting either. Human nature will go a long way to please, while the blizzard of compromise brings but a twitch of the head and a toss of the shoulders and—balkiness.

There's always a way of suggestion and explanation. We may think it beneath us, but is it? Isn't any way best that will bring about right results with the least friction possible? Arbitrariness defeats its own ends, and what does it gain for us who use it? Anything except a desire on the part of others to shun us?

There are times when we must stand for principles. But there are other times when some other way than our own would do exactly as well, produce exactly as good results. Why then insist on any course of action merely because it is our own way? Let's learn to be large-hearted in our associations.

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Big Increase In Canadian Wheat Crop

OTTAWA, Sept. 16—The Canadian wheat crop this year will be 289,000,000 bushels against 193,000,000 last year from latest official estimate of the Bureau of Census. The oat crop is placed 556,000,000 bushels, compared with 394,000,000; while barley be 64,000,000 compared with 56,000,000 last year. In the prairie provinces alone the wheat estimate is 260,000,000, oats 359,000,000, barley 43,762,000 and rye 10,817,000.
