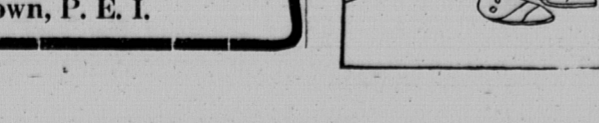
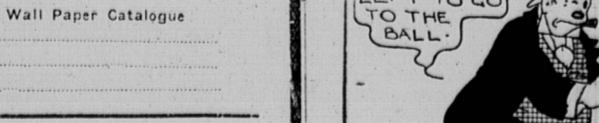
VISIONS FOR HER SECURITY must be settled before another land and air disarmament can be discussed. These statements were made upon the official authority of the Foreign Office this afternoon.

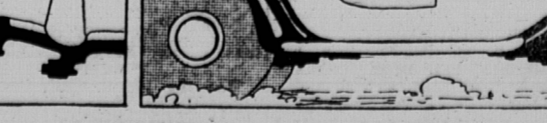
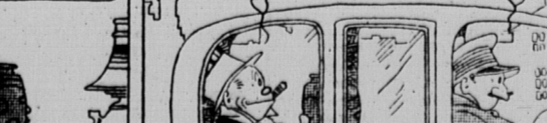
