SHOCKING REVELATIONS.

The revolting and horrible revelations in connection with American meat-packing industries are almost unprintable. Those who eat canned meats or sausages of Chicago make will consult their comfort by not reading what has been printed. The revelations strike hard at the great meat trust and at the enormous export trade in meats from the United States. In 1900 the packing house products of the country reached the vast total of \$700,251,586 and this has since been greatly increased.

About half the total output of this industry comes from Chicago, where some 12,000,000 head of cattle swine and sheep are slaughtered annually. Other principal centres are Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph and Milwaukee. Enormous stores are kept on hand. From 150 million to 300 million pounds of dead meats are kept constantly in storage. Chicago alone had 100 million pounds in hand at the end of last year. A nauseated world will shorten its demand greatly in view of the revelations which President Roosevelt has called "revol" Proper inspection, and a general cleaning up will result from the exposure, but it will be long before the world's confidence is restored. The facts brought out are too horrible.

The eighty old men in the Senate who so greedily swallowed the salary grab, are not likely to propound any scheme of Senate reform that will satisfy a disgusted country. If they were penitent and disposed to make restitution we might have some hope of them.

The Murray Harbor Branch furnishes the strange anomaly of a government road connecting a rich and prosperous section of country with the city and having but one train each way daily. There is nothing like this anywhere else in Canada. The people are entitled to a better service and the large traffic warrants it. Morning and afternoon trains, outward and inward and the carrying of the mails by train are imperative necessities.

Nova Scotia is one of the more fortunate Provinces of Eastern Canada in the matter of provincial revenue. The receipts from royalties in coal and other minerals afford a large assured and increasing income. But Premier Murray takes strong ground in favor of increasing the provincial subsidies and counts confidently on such an increase to follow the meeting of federal and provincial ministers which is to be convened at an early day. There is we believe now a good basis on which we hope for such an improvement.

THE TRIUMPH OF PROHIBITION.

Yesterday the electors of Queens County by an overwhelming majority voted on the Scott Act in order that the Prohibitory Law may take its place. This is the completion of the work of bringing the three counties under the provincial Prohibitory Act of 1900.

It is a splendid endorsement of that law that six years after it was enacted and five years after it came into force in Charlottetown, it is thus approved by the three counties. All honor to the voters who went to the polls at a busy season to effect this result.

We congratulate the friends of prohibition here and elsewhere on this splendid work. We congratulate the Temperance Alliance who fought so strenuously to have prohibition enacted, and the Government and Legislature that enacted it, on the hearty, earnest and unthought vote which has endorsed this great measure at the polls from one end of the Island to the other. Space will not permit further comment today.

Premier Scott, the Winnipeg Free Press and other public spokesmen object to the term Northwest as applied to the Canadian prairie country. They would have it spoken of generally as Western Canada. The objection seems to lie against the first part of the word "Northwest." They would eliminate the word "north" as being too expressive of a cold climate. The change proposed has also the merit of brevity, but it will not have any material effect upon the thermometer.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 3 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least 6 months' residence upon the land and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
