Miss McEwen, sister of the late Mrs. J. D. McLeod, left yesterday afternoon on a visit to New London while her home in this City is being repaired as a result of the recent fire.

On account of several of the Prince of Wales College students going down to Montague the basket ball games to have been played in the Y.M.C.A. this evening have been postponed till next Tuesday evening.

The coldest temperature registered yesterday was four degrees above zero, the warmest was sixteen above, and at nine last night it was ten above. Wednesday night the coldest temperature was ten degrees above.

The ice boats which left Cape Traverse yesterday morning succeeded in reaching Cape Tormentine at one thirty p.m., but the Cape Tormentine boats did not cross, so that all boats are on the other side and will wait permitting return to Cape Traverse today. The foreign mail was sent to Georgetown by special last night and will cross by the Stanley today to Pictou.

W. L. Watt, representing the Halifax and Yarmouth Steamship Company, has returned to Halifax from Cape Breton, where he has been some time in the interests of the new service which this company will inaugurate at the opening of navigation, by placing a new steamer (now building) on the Halifax-Cape Breton, and Prince Edward Island route, calling at Port Hastings, Port Mulgrave, Port Hood, Mabou, Margaree, Cheticamp, Souris, Montague, and Georgetown. This steamer is being built to enter every harbor on the route.

The annual meeting of the Kinkora Baiting Association was held recently and the following directors elected: Hugh Duffy, Jas. M. Duffy, Wm. McKenzie, John Keele, Michael Mulligan, Frank Hamilton and J. J. Smith, John P. Smith, Secy. The receipts, from the sale of cheese amounted to \$11,620.16. Among the one hundred and two patrons sending over twenty thousand pounds of milk were Calvin T. Reeves, 30,095 lbs. P. J. Trainor, 20,418 lbs. James McCardle, 23,834 lbs. Michael Farmer, 21,527. Hugh Duffy, 21,187 lbs. Wm. McKenzie, 20,616. John Trainor, 20, 962. The patrons are to be congratulated on their very fine showing.

A report which has been awaited with considerable interest is that of Stanfield's Limited. In view of the unsettled trade conditions during 1908 it was doubted that this company would show any appreciable increase over the earnings for the previous year. The statement just to hand giving profits of \$98,985, compared with \$71,728, comes rather as a pleasant surprise showing as it does an improvement of over \$17,000 for the year. After payment of usual preferred dividends, bond interest, making a liberal allowance for depreciation in buildings of \$37,543, and \$12,600 for contingent account, the profit and loss is increased by \$5,900.—Halifax Herald.

The second hole there has been drilled to a depth of one thousand six hundred and eighty five feet, but owing to one hundred feet caving in, it was necessary to suspend operations. Mr. Stover reports that the difficulties of reaching a depth of two thousand five hundred feet at the second point are much greater than where they first began work, the strata being more broken. Fortunately they were able to withdraw the tools before they were destroyed by the cave in. To attain the required depth it will be necessary to start the boring where firmer strata exist.—Pat.
