Nickel Imports And Exports To Great Britain

LONDON, Dec. 5.—(C.P. Cable)—Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, today told the House of Commons the United Kingdom's imports of nickel during the first 10 months of the year totalled 1,073 tons, valued at £217,000. He placed exports of the metal at 1,935 tons and valued them at £917,000.

Of the exports he said 1,131 tons went to Germany, 802 to Japan, 523 to Russia and 426 to France. Exports of 205 tons went almost entirely to Russia, he added.

He made his statement in reply to a question.

Once Noted Actor In Charity Ward

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Corse Payton, who made millions so when he played the melodrama "Over The Hill to the Poorhouse" was ill tonight of pneumonia in a hospital's charity ward.

A quarter of a century ago he was a matinee idol, the hero of a thousand pots, the dashing, gallant lover who walked through snow to lift the mortgage from the old homestead, who saved death to rescue the heroine just after the moustached villain sneered "ha, my proud beauty."

He is 66 n.w. He was born in Brooklyn, where he began a career which led the critics to dub him America's "best bad actor." Payton became a nationally known character. But the melodramas were relegated to the showboats and the tank towns and Payton was growing old. The movies came along and gradually he dropped out of sight. In 1921, he was bankrupt.

When the bar returned he attempted a comeback with a combination beer garden and stock company.

And things were going pretty well with him until he was stricken.

Multiplicity Of Liquor Laws In United States

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Spirits, forbidden by the United States for 13 years, may legally be sold this afternoon in at least 16 states.

The regulations of several other states, dry as the prohibition veil lifts, are at work on bills designed to permit sales.

The legal drinking status of the United States follows:

Alabama—No bars; hotels, restaurants and clubs may sell for consumption in dining rooms, tap rooms and bedrooms; grocery and delicatessen stores to sell in packages for consumption off premises.

Arizona—Only with meals in restaurants; hotels; in packages from drug, grocery and regular liquor stores, unlimited.

California—Only wine and beer with meals; hard liquor in packages for off-premise consumption.

Colorado—Beer and wines in restaurants, hotels and dining cars; hard liquor in packages for off-premise consumption.

Connecticut—Beer in taverns; wine and beer in hotels and restaurants; hard liquor in packages.

Delaware—No bars; hotels, restaurants and clubs may sell for consumption in dining rooms, tap rooms and bedrooms; grocery and delicatessen stores to sell in packages for consumption off premises.

Florida—No.

Georgia—No.

Idaho—No.

Illinois—Unrestricted except in Chicago where local ordinance prohibits perpendicular drinking; Legislature at work on control law.

Iowa—No bars; hotels, restaurants and clubs may sell for consumption in dining rooms, tap rooms and bedrooms; grocery and delicatessen operate for other states.

Maine—Anything goes.

Maryland—No, until Legislature acts.

Massachusetts—Unsettled; Legislature at work on bills; its House opposing the presence of women in taverns.

Michigan—32 until Legislature acts.

Minnesota—No.

Mississippi—No.

Missouri—No, until Legislature acts.

Montana—State to vend liquor, not yet ready with stocks.

Nevada—Anything goes except where dry by local option.

New Hampshire—No.

New Jersey—Saloons and bars under commission control.

New Mexico—No bars; any firm under same management three years may sell.

New York—No bars; drinking with or without meals in hotels, restaurants, or in packages in no other business, may sell up to three gallons of hard liquor or three gallons of wine per person.

North Carolina—No.

North Dakota—No.

Ohio—32 until Legislature acts.

Oklahoma—No.

Oregon—Control unsettled.

Pennsylvania—State takes over sale of hard liquor in packages on Jan. 2; hotels and restaurants may sell in meantime.

Rhode Island—Drinking only with meals in hotels; licensed stores to sell package goods; drug stores limited to one quart per person.

South Carolina—One quart per month per person may be imported on application to county judge.

South Dakota—No.

Motorvessel Crew Escape Death

HALIFAX, Dec. 5.—Crew of the motorvessel Yamaska narrowly escaped death today when a furnace explosion wrecked her forecastle and wrenched planking in the hull.

The explosion occurred shortly after a seaman had lighted the furnace in the forecastle. A frozen water pipe was believed responsible for the blast which caused damage of \$1,000.

Had the furnace exploded a few minutes later, the crew would have been seated around the forecastle table for dinner. They were on deck at the time. The vessel is tied up at a Halifax wharf.

PAYS PENALTY

WINDSOR, Ont., Dec. 5.—(C.P.)—Peter Melvin Boyak this morning paid the penalty for the murder of Mrs. Jessie Mahrebeck. He died on the scaffold in Essex County Jail at 12:10 a. m., the first hanging here in 33 years.

Seeks New Trial After Conviction For Kidnapping

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—The full bench of the Supreme Court yesterday took under advisement a plea on behalf of Kenneth Buck, convicted kidnapper of Margaret McMath, 10-year-old Cape Cod school girl. Buck sought a new trial on exceptions taken during his trial before Judge Edward F. Hanly.

Now serving 25 years in State Prison, Buck alleged through his counsel that evidence which should not legally have been admitted was produced against him.

The McMath girl was kidnapped from school at Harwichport on May 2 and returned four days later after \$50,000 ransom was paid. The money was recovered by one of Buck and his brother Cyril were brought to trial. Cyril was acquitted.

Civic Voting In Ontario

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—Many Ontario cities and towns last night chose their 1934 councilors, mayors, reeves and other civic government heads with starting upsets occurring in Hamilton and Ottawa.

Patrick J. Nolan, veteran civic politician of the capital, returned to the battlements to defeat Mayor J. J. Allen, seeking a fourth straight term. Nolan won the contest by a majority of 6,122 over Allen.

The vote was: Nolan, 11,695; Allen, 13,470; Peter A. Gray, 308 and Dudley Booth, 360. Nolan had not appeared in the civic political field for some time and his return and victory was a surprise to Ottawans.

After a hectic campaign Mayor John Peebles, Hamilton's outspoken mayor for four years, fell before a last-minute entry. The victor was Herbert Wilson who polled 23,978 votes to Mayor Peebles' 17,265. This was one of the outstanding upsets of the elections.

Ice Conditions In St. Lawrence

QUEBEC, Dec. 5.—Conditions yesterday prevented the scheduled departure of a convoy of ships for the difficult trip through the ice-choked St. Lawrence to the open sea and Europe.

At dawn the ice-breaker N. B. McLean advanced onto the port but the vessels wishing to sail were unable to form a convoy and departure was retarded until tomorrow.

The freighter Brandon coming from Montreal arrived here last night accompanied by the ice-breaker Lady Gray and joined the several ships waiting to sail towards the sea.

Surrounded by ice-fields off Cape Saumon, the freighter Gaspesia called the ice-breaker to its aid. The ice-breaker succeeded in seeing the ship and accompanied some distance on her way.


FOUR NUGGETS FOUND IN GOOSE BOUGHT IN TORONTO; SLEUTHS ARE AT LOSS
