A National Shell Game. Like the gullible folks at the county fair, who wager good money on their ability to select the shell under which they think the fakir put the little ball, American voters gamble prosperity, sobriety and the nation's welfare on "government control."

The Liquor Interests Can't Lose. The advantages of this system to the liquor industry are succinctly given by Hon. E. C. Drury, a former premier of Ontario Province, Canada. He is quoted by Walter P. Davison, noted Canadian publicist: "I think if I were interested in the manufacture or sale of liquor, I would regard government control as being the most admirable system that could be devised, because (1) it removes from the drink traffic its ancient stigma, and makes it respectable; (2) it puts the drink traffic behind the finances of the nation—entrenching it behind the finances of the nation—entrenching it behind the needs of the public treasury; and (3) it opens up a field of reputable consumption which has never before been touched. And now what benefits has it bestowed upon the American people as shown by its four years operation?"

What Respectability Has Done. (1) It has multiplied the number of liquor dispensaries threefold, with a consequent proportional increase in drunkenness, since the drink traffic became "respectable" by the simple process of appropriating restaurants, cafes, hotel dining rooms, confectioneries, grocery stores, etc., and discarding the name "Saloon."

Liquor in Account With the Nation. (2) It has proved to be a tremendous financial liability to the nation. The bill of the American people for legalized liquors in the last four years has mounted to over fifteen billion dollars. The American Business Men's Research Foundation estimates its social cost for the four years at fifteen billion more.

A Menace to Women and Girls. (3) It most assuredly has opened up a great new field of consumption. Women and girls and boys are packing the cocktail rooms and taverns. "Ladies Entrance" signs of the old days have gone the way of the wooden In-
