MR. MCLEAN said it was well known that a purchaser of 1,000 tons or more at the mines got a reduction of 30 cents per ton below what smaller buyers pay. The Government, which uses over a thousand tons annually, had direct and save \$300.

WITNESS FOUND TO THE WASHTUB WILL

BOSTON, March 22—One of the witnesses to the will of Patrick Monahan of Charleston has been found. He is John T. Murphy of New York. Yesterday interrogatories were filed in the probate office and application was made for leave to take the deposition in New York. The will was found nailed to the bottom of a washtub. The testator left about \$250,000. John Monahan, a brother of the deceased, named as executor in the will, refused to serve or to offer the instrument for probate. A nephew, James Tosney, moved to have the will allowed. None of the three witnesses to the will, Murphy, Edward Davis and Mary A. Watson, could be found and it was generally reported that the witnesses were mythical. Charges of forgery of the instrument were heard. John F. Lynch, counsel for Annie Fall and Frances McGinness, two nieces, who are legatees under the

will, found the instrument, and his efforts to get the witnesses have been rewarded in finding Murphy. Murphy has admitted that he signed a will for Monahan. He says it was signed in the store of the deceased in Charleston. He further says that David, a witness, is a traveling salesman, and Mary A. Watson is a young woman about 25 years old. Another woman of that name, well along in years, who was a friend of Monahan, had been found and denied she signed the will. She could not write. The mystery deepened in consequence of this information and the first light that has been shed on the identity of the woman who signed as a witness has come from Murphy. Murphy did not know either Miss Watson or Davis, having met them for the first time in Manhattan's store. Monahan asked all three to witness his will.

MRS. DE GOGORZA GIVEN \$300 MONTHLY ALIMONY

NEW YORK, March 22—Alimony of \$300 a month was awarded yesterday by Justice O'Gorman in the supreme court to Mrs. Elsa de Gogorza, pending the trial of her suit for a separation from Emilio de Gogorza, the baritone concert singer. Mrs. Gogorza asked for \$10,000 a year and the singer offered to continue the allowance \$250 a month he has been making her since their separation in July, 1907.

The Gogorzas were married on October 9, 1896, and got along well until just before they separated. Gogorza is now on tour with Mme Emma Eames. Mrs. Gogorza declares that he besought her to divorce him so that he could marry again, but Mrs. Gogorza refused. Then he left her and they have since lived apart.

JESUITS TO STUDY CAUSE OF EARTHQUAKE

CLEVELAND, O., March 22—The Order of Jesuits today began a world-wide movement for the study of earthquakes. The organization of the movement is in charge of Rev. Fred Odenbach, of St. Ignatius college, in this city.

Father Odenbach, who invented the electric seismograph, explained that

to have been looked after before the subsidies conference. He called attention to the large expense for new floors in the College and other repairs which ought not to be necessary for a new building. Why had the school enrolment fallen off 1,000 last year? It was the smallest enrolment in 30 years. Is it that population is decreasing, or that children are not attending school? He believed the School Act is better than its enforcement. He quoted from the Superintendent's report which recommends a reduction of the Government allowance if the supplement fell off. This was on the principle of taking away from him that hath not. He argued that after the loss of many good teachers this would tend to drive away the few who remain. He held that every Province had applied a portion of the increased subsidy to improve the schools.

PREMIER HASZARD inquired whether any Province was paying more for education more than we?

MR. MATHIESON said Alberta and Saskatchewan were paying more. He read from the schools report that in some schools the country pays \$30 to \$56 per head of the pupils. This state of things would not exist if the law were carried out. There was a provision where the attendance fell below 20 the grant should be limited. This had not been done. He quoted from Inspector McCormack, whom he praised as an educationist who is worth far more than the country pays him, to show the decline in the public schools. Many were taught by new beginners and others by unlicensed. Twenty out of 28 teachers who had died, perished of consumption, largely the result of ill-ventilated schools. Coming to the question of school books, he said it was two years since the question was brought up, but we were yet standing still. He moved the adjournment of the debate.

Progress was reported and at 11.10 the House adjourned till tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

MAY EXTEND THE MEDICAL COURSE

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 22—The Association of America Medical Colleges at its meeting here yesterday decided that for the present it will not attempt to raise further the standard of educational requirements for admission to medical schools in the country.

Educational conditions are not at present such as to permit a concerted and general move in this direction it was decided "but the association will endeavor to establish a standard of preparatory work equal to a four years' high school course as given in the best eastern states. As soon as conditions warrant a further step, two years of under-graduate work in a recognized college will be advocated."

Another move, which it was declared, the association will push as soon as conditions warrant will be the extension of the medical course to five years, which is the requirement as present in Canada and Great Britain.
