NEW YORK, March 17.—Eight games remain on the National Hockey League schedule before the annual Stanley Cup playoffs. But only two or three of them can have any effect on the final standing of the clubs.

It has already been determined that the Boston Bruins, champions of the United States section, will meet the Montreal Maroons, title holders in the Canadian group, in one playoff series, and the chances are that Canadians of Montreal will be paired with the Chicago Black Hawks in another and the New York Rangers with the Ottawa Senators.

The annual Stanley Cup matches, which determine the hockey championship of the world, are on this week with the Boston Bruins hot favorites to retain the title which they won last year. At this writing, the Montreal Maroons loom as the most serious threat to the Hub team's hope of repeating.

Since the Stanley Cup rules admit three teams in each group to the competition, it is possible for a second or third place team in the regular season race to win the world's championship. However, there are enough cup matches to bear out the theory that "class will tell," so it seems reasonably certain that the Stanley Cup play and play-offs will feature a duel between the Bruins and the Maroons.

Bruins and Maroons are the leaders of the American and International groups respectively of the National Hockey League. Star for star the Maroons compare favorably with the Bruins, and only the slight differences in team efficiency should determine the superiority between Montreal and Boston in this "fastest of all scrimmaging sports."
