Petition To Premier Bell And Mayors Of Cities And Towns Throughout The Maritime Provinces

To Hon. John H. Bell, Premier of Prince Edward Island and Mayors and leaders of cities and towns throughout the Maritime Provinces.

The Canadian Club of Boston is mindful of the great responsibility resting upon it as the representative organization composed of 1,000 members of Canadian birth and affiliations living in Boston and New England, and conscious of the great need of still further stimulating sentimental and business ties now existing between Canada, the land of our birth, and New England.

At an executive meeting of this Club held on 19th inst., the following resolution was unanimously passed: We forward this to you with the sincere hope that you will cause a Commission or Committee to take cognizance thereof, and take such steps as to bring the matter of Old Home Week through our Prince Edward Island and the other maritime provinces to a successful conclusion in the summer of 1924.

WHEREAS: The matter of Old Home Week in 1924 has been before the people of Nova Scotia and the Maritime Provinces for some years, and its many advantages have been fully explained and admitted, and as the matter has been again forcibly brought to our attention by the great interest manifested by the County of Pictou celebrating the coming summer the landing of the good ship "Hector" which brought settlers from Scotland to that County, we feel compelled by a sense of the fitness of the occasion and the subject of Old Home Week to present the matter before you for the following reasons:

1. An Old Home Week held throughout Nova Scotia in the summer of 1924, in all the Counties, Cities and Towns, of the maritime provinces, will attract attention far and wide in the minds of Sons and Daughters of Nova Scotia and the Maritime Provinces from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and particularly throughout New England.

2. Thousands of persons here have expressed a great desire to participate in the Old Home Week, as was evidenced at the great mass meeting of Canadians at Symphony Hall last April. The representatives of Canada who spoke at that meeting were impressed and convinced, that such a great desire exists here.

3. The Old Home Week will be the means of attracting such a great number of former Maritimers to visit their homeland, that large sums of money will be put in circulation in every city, town and county, which must greatly benefit the Provinces.

4. A great mental stimulus will be created, a higher estimation of Nova Scotia and the other Maritime Provinces as the great summer resort, a great playground for New England, that its reactive effect upon the American tourist class and travelling public will be stimulating and helpful to the transportation companies, hotels and boarding houses, so that every avenue of commercial activity will be benefited.

Resolved: - That as the above reasons for holding an Old Home Week in the summer of 1924 are so convincing, making such an event in our opinion an absolute necessity, particularly to emphasize and announce the great betterment and establishment of fine automobile highways constructed at great expense throughout the Provinces, we therefore petition you, on behalf of the many thousands of former Canadians living here to accede to the great wish and desire and take immediate steps to put this plan for Old Home Week in the summer of 1924 into execution and accomplishment.

The grateful thanks of the members of the Canadian Club here, in behalf of all Canadians, including the members of the Women's Auxiliary (400 members) who join in the request are hereby conveyed to you with full expectation and hope that the subject may receive prompt and favorable consideration of yourself and on the part of the Government of the Provinces, and Mayors of Cities and Towns.

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION FIGURES DROP 24 PER CENT - OTTAWA, March 6 - From the British Columbia lately been showing a decrease, when compared with the corresponding period of 1922. At the same time, from the United States, the number of immigrants increased, British immigration in 1923 totaled 1,057,000, from the United States last month, and 1,002,000 of last year. Immigration in the ten months ending January 31, totaled 10,268,000, a corresponding period of the fiscal year, or a decrease of 2 per cent.

South African Barrier Against Asiatics - CAPE TOWN, Mar. 6 - The appellate division of the court has delivered an important judgment on the question of immigration into South Africa. By a majority of 4-3 the appellate judges have ordered the notice issued by the minister of the interior of the effect of which will be to allow all Asiatics to enter after all Asiatics have been admitted under the Asiatics Restriction Act.
