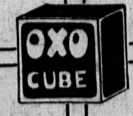


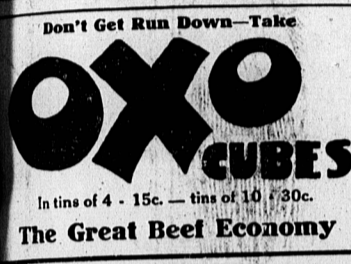

Even Kings Have Troubles About the most uncomfortable Royal head in the world just at present says a South African paper, is August Mokhatle, the chief of the Bafokeny tribe in the Ruesenbors district. His capital city, Phokeng, in which he is living at present, is openly rebellious and insulting. The rest of his tribe outside the city, about 20,000 strong, are loyal to most to a man, yet he cannot fly to them because flight would be tantamount to abdication. August himself is a very likeable and respectful old native and lives with his wife and family in the centre of Phokeng. He has ruled the tribe since 1897, and will roundly reprove the inquiring European to that date carved above his front door. He dresses in European clothes and has a penchant for fancy-colored socks. His educational accomplishments amount to a good knowledge of Afrikaans and a fair smattering of English. His business, however, is conducted by two well educated secretaries, one for English and one for Afrikaans. A newspaper representative who visited August a short time ago found him rather depressed over the trouble in his tribe. His quarrel is more with the leaders (many of whom are his relatives) than with the rebel rank and file. One of his principal grievances against his irregular relations is that they regularly come to church and occupy front pews!
