WYOMING

Heavy Hitting Teams in Big Baseball Leagues

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—It would not have taken more than one guess to pick the heaviest hitting outfield in baseball last year. The Yankee combination of Ruth, Meusel and Combs wrought havoc on all sides. This season, however, its siege gun power has waned, especially since July, so much so that the Athletics now boast the heaviest attack of any of the four clubs in the closing pennant scramble.

The Yankee trio boasted a combination average of .350 with the stick in 1927, but the latest unofficial averages show a falling off to .317, with the chief reservist, Ben Paschal, around the same notch. The Athletics are ten points higher with a mark of .297 for they have seen the most service—Simmons, Miller, Cobb and French.

The reversible Giant outfield forces offer considerable contrast. The strongest trio at bat averaging around .320, consists of Walsh, Ott and O'Doul. The combination of Walsh, Reese and Mann is barely able to muster an average of .300 but it is more effective against southpaw pitching. The youthful Ott is the hardest natural hitter in the collection but Walsh and Reese have been setting a terrific pace lately.

The Cards have a great slugger in Chick Haley, who hits them earnestly and far but it takes his excellent mark of around .340 to put St. Louis' average up to .304. Douthitt covers a lot of ground in centre but has not been hitting consistently. Harper and Holm, who divide the rightfield responsibilities also are somewhat erratic. Defensively the veteran Yankee trio is the best of the lot. There are not two better throwing arms in the business than those of Ruth and Meusel while Combs is a ball-hawk. "Wyoming" Has Many Thrills

TIM MCCOY'S BEST ROLE

Tim McCoy's understanding of the North American Indians has enabled him to turn out one of the best western film dramas that has come to the screen in many years. That McCoy knows his Indians has been proved long ago in the other stirring film dramas he has turned out, but "Wyoming" his latest picture, now being shown at the Capitol Theatre, is, by far, his best starring production in the last year.

From a pictorial standpoint the picture is one of the most beautiful that has ever been flashed on the screen.

It has the plains and mountains of Wyoming as a background and the Indian hordes which are used in the battle sequences are real red men borrowed from the Wind River reservation.

For that reason they may not look like the ordinary conception of Indians of those movie-goers who have been used to seeing white men disguised as Indian braves.

McCoy has the reputation of knowing more about the American Indians than any other living white man. His pictures corroborate this reputation.

"Wyoming" is the story of the opening of the Indian lands of that state to white settlement. It depicts the broken treaties with the red men, presidential speeches of famine and privation suffered by the aborigines and shows why they avinced the bitterness which caused hundreds of white men, women and children to fall beneath savage bullets and scaling knife.

McCoy, who has been a lieutenant colonel in the U. S. cavalry, plays the role of a young lieutenant of troopers stationed in the far west during the period of Indian unrest just prior to the Civil War. He looks every inch a soldier and there is no doubt he was born in the saddle.

Dorothy Sebastian, who played opposite him in "California," has the featured feminine role of the daughter of a wagon train guide who takes her father's place and guides an emigrant train towards the Indian reservation. She plays the role in a most charming and convincing manner.

HOOVER GETS UNFAVORABLE REPORT

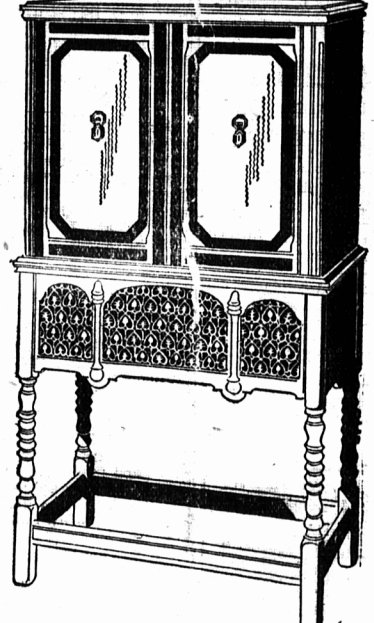
WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—A decidedly unfavorable report of the political situation in the Northwestern wheat belt was brought to Herbert Hoover today by Senator Lynn J. Fraser of North Dakota, after the Republican presidential candidate had received encouraging news from such widely separated States as Wyoming and Florida. Fraser, the Republican member of the Progressive group in the Senate, who has endorsed Hoover's candidacy, said that the situation in North Dakota was far from satisfactory and that there was much discontent among the farmers. He added that his information was that a similar situation existed in South Dakota, Montana and Minnesota.
