BOWLING CONTROVERSY

(C. F. Cable)
LONDON, Dec. 28.—Another storm over that old bugbear—"bodily bowling"—threatened tonight in British cricket circles.
It arose when cables from Sydney, Australia, today revealed for the first time the M. C. C. governing body of cricket, last October had conveyed to the Australian cricket authorities an apology for the use of this style of trundling by William Voce in a match between Voce and Clive Hastings-Hamshire, and the touring Aussie. The M. C. C. further assured the Australians the Notts directors had taken the "necessary steps" against a repetition.
A. W. Carr, former Notts captain who had resolutely supported Voce and Harold Larwood—who started the thing in the first place—said he was "disgusted" when he learned tonight of the apology for Voce. He himself refused to say anything.
A prominent member of the M.C.C. Committee admitted that he had expected trouble in English cricket circles since word of the action came from Australia before any announcement was made of the latter here.

Have to Battle For Cape's Cod

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Dec. 27.—The world's record kabaljaw (a species of cod) has been caught in Cape Province waters at the mouth of the Kalkbuis river. It weighed 112 pounds, was six feet four inches long and had a girth of 44 inches.
The fish was too big for gaffing from the boat and had to be played for two hours until it was exhausted and towed ashore. The largest previous catch of kabaljaw recorded weighed 158 pounds, and was seven feet long. This was also caught in Cape Province waters in the neighborhood of False Bay.
The kabaljaw is a Dutch term for a species of cod which differs from the fish of the same name in home waters. The same type exists off the British coast, particularly in the North Sea, but it is smaller. It is a perch-like species known as the drum from the drumming noise it makes under the water.

Older Boys Parliament In Sackville

Victor Murray, of New Glasgow, N. S., led a devotional service at an informal meeting of 31 members in Mount Allison University tonight. The Tux quartette of Sydney, Carman Crawford, Lloyd Macdonald, Aubrey Moore and Douglas Scott gave two vocal selections. J. Lloyd Jess, clerk of the Parliament, presided and Rev. A. Judson Levy, Maritime Boy's Work secretary, welcomed the boys to the Parliament.

BAER FLOORS LEVINSKY FOR COUNT

Heavyweight Champion Connects With Knockout Punch In Second Round.

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—King Levinsky, the heavyweight rock of Chicago, finished flat on his back with his toes pointing to the roof in the second round of his scheduled four-round bout with Max Baer, world's heavyweight champion, in the Stadium tonight.
Never before knocked out, and only once floored although he fought them all, Levinsky was dropped with a murderous right-hand blast to the jaw after Baer had knocked him sagging into the ropes with a vicious body attack. The dramatic knockout came after 53 seconds of the second round.
The bout, billed as a four-round exhibition, was a vicious battle from the start. A crowd of 14,015 spectators paid \$29,716 to witness it.
Baer was inclined to clown a little in the first round, but the reformed fish peddler was serious about it and he succeeded in out-pointing Baer in the opening three minutes, principally because Baer made little or no attempt to fight back.
Levinsky had the champion's gloving red at the end of the first round as a result of connecting with wild swinging rights.
As the bell sounded for the second round, Baer waited in his corner, hoping Levinsky would come showing up well during the tilt and although not playing against the champion to come out and fight. With a snarl on his face, Baer suddenly charged and tore into Levinsky, driving him around the ring under a terrific body punishment.
The Kingfish attempted to escape but Baer tore after him, compelling him to retreat under a terrific barrage. He showed no mercy to Levinsky and deliberately tried to knock him out as quickly as possible.
Levinsky was going away when Baer caught up with him, driving him to the ropes with terrific smashes to the body. Cool and deliberate, but fighting mad, Baer drove a vicious right hand to Levinsky's chin. Levinsky fell flat on his back and didn't move until his handlers came into the ring to drag him to the corner.
He weighed in at 211 pounds, just one more than he did when he won the championship from Primo Carnera last June, and was in marvelous condition. So was Levinsky. He weighed 201 pounds, the lowest footage he has achieved for any recent bout. They both wore six ounce fighting gloves. Instead of the eight-ounce pillows usually used for exhibitions.

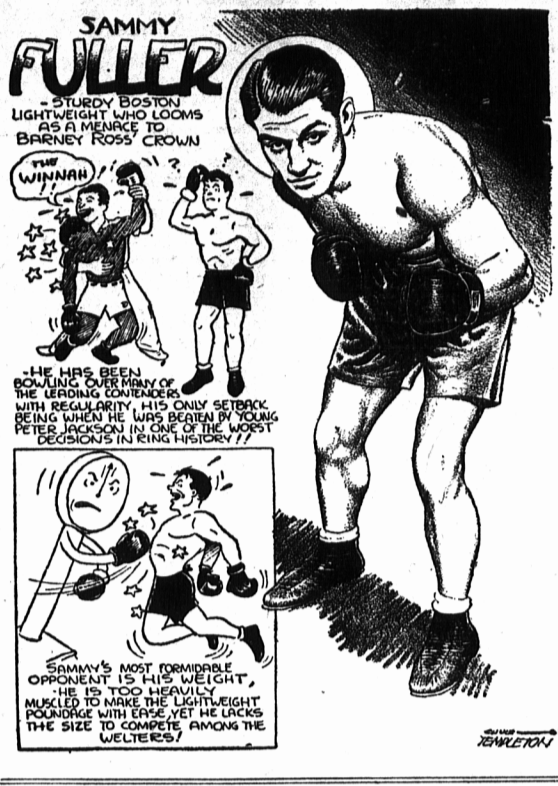
Seek To Stop Klick - Ross Boxing Bout

Along The Sidelines

IT WAS A REGULAR parade of hockey talent at the Forum last night in the exhibition doubleheader between two junior teams in one tilt and a mixture of intermediate and senior players in the other, no less than forty-eight hockeyists taking part in the twin bill. Both games were productive of fast hockey and some rugged bodying with plenty of rivalry thrown in for good measure. Royals gave the Junior Abbies a tough time of it before going to their much more experienced opponents 3-0, and by their showing definitely established themselves as no mean challengers for the Island crown now worn so jauntily by last night's winners. Goals by Harry Currie, Blanchard and Bunky Fitzgerald accounted for the only scores of the game but only erratic shooting on the losers' part plus the great work of Price in the Abbie cage kept the Royals off the score sheet, on numerous occasions. The young Abbie goalie gave a sparkling performance to earn his shutout and in this department the Abbies are well fortified to defend their '33-'34 laurels.
A SEVEN-ALL deadlock was the result of the game between the combined forces of the intermediates and seniors. Intermediate players accounted for the only scores of the game but only erratic shooting on the seniors' lines, as was the original intention, displayed a smart passing game that accounted for five of the game's counters. They should go far in the intermediate ranks this season. The ability is there and the stiff workouts they are in the habit of having should bring it out in full force.
HOW TIMES have changed. Time was in the not too distant past when a defeat of an Upper Canadian team by a Maritime outfit would be hailed with much rejoicing but now it is just taken as a matter of course. PRIMROSES LOSE OPENER TO CRYSTALS

Summerside Team Show Class In Turning Back Intermediate Champs 6-3.

Frying the lid off the local season the Crystal turned back the Montgomery Primroses last year's Island intermediate champions in a torrid exhibition tilt by a 6-3 score. The game was featured by wide open, fast skating attacks by both teams and was more even than the score would indicate. The stellar work of Herbie Schurman in the local nets kept the Primroses savage thrusts from rolling up the score.
Five minutes after the start of the game Woodside eluded the defence to go right in and chalk up the initial marker. At the fourteen minute mark Chick Gallant took a smooth pass from Clarence Steele to make the count 2-0. Montgomery put on the pressure and on a power play Bear slammed the rubber into the twine for the visitors' first counter. Just before the gong O'Brien drove a hard one in but the play was called.
After several minutes of torrid play in the second stanza, Woodside drove a long one from the blue line which knifed between McEwen's pads. Two minutes later C. Steele scored to make it 4-2. In a wild melee around the visitors' nets, Phillips snared a loose puck and slid it into the net.
The third period opened fast and both teams had golden opportunities to score as the goalies were drawn out of the nets but it was not until the half-way mark that Wattersworth accepted a goal-mouth pass from Bear to notch up another for the final Primroses tally. Just before the final gong C. Steele lifted the puck into the corner, chased it in, and coming from behind the net, poked the rubber between McEwen and the post to make the final score 6-3.
C. Steele, Chick Gallant, Woodside and Montgomery were outstanding for the locals, while Wattersworth, Bear and McEwen turned in a stellar performance for the visitors.

FRENCHMAN SETS NEW WORLD SPEED RECORD
LIRE, France, Dec. 28.—The world speed record for land planes over a closed course was smashed today by the veteran French pilot Raymond Delmoite with an average of 314 miles an hour.
The 40-year-old flier, who has held several world records during his career, shot his trim French Caudron-Renault monoplane over the circuit course for one lap at 321 miles an hour.
It was only after a year and more of dogged attempts that he managed to crack the mark of 306 miles an hour set by the late James Wedell of the United States in 1933. Wedell died in a plane crash last June.
Several times in the last few months Delmoite had come close to breaking the record.

Touring British Consols Lose Second Straight Exhibition Game 6-3

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 28.—The touring British Consols hockey team of Toronto lost their second straight game on their visit to the Maritimes here tonight when the Moncton Hawks defeated them 6-3. Only a small crowd of fans braved an icy wind and sub-zero temperatures to see the game which however contained plenty of action and was approved as a good exhibition game.
Hawks had the edge over the visitors in every department of play, scored twice in the first period, three times in the second and once in the final session. Two of Toronto's goals came in the third period when Len Burrage of the Hawks was serving a penalty. Their other counter, in the second period, came off goalie Jimmy Foster's stick into the twine—it was a long whistling shot by Ken Grivel, sturdy right winger of the Consols. Norman Mann and Norman Lamport accounted for the other two goals, one of which was disputed by Hawks. Supported by fans in the section of the rink behind the goal, Hawks claimed the rubber was not over the line. The goal-judge admitted that he pulled the light prematurely and that it was not a goal, but referee Bus McLeod allowed it.
Bill Miller, captain of the Hawks led the scoring tonight, rapping in three goals, while Len Burrage scored two and assisted in two others, one of which was scored by Dud James. Duke Campbell assisted in three of the counters.

HAYNES SOLD TO BOSTON

MONTREAL, Dec. 28.—Last of the 1930 Allan Cup team, Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, to play for Montreal Maroons of the National Hockey League which signed the amateur team almost on a lull. Paul Haynes, centre, today was sold for cash to Boston Bruins.
Haynes will join his new club in New York Sunday, playing against Rangers there. He had been in poor health since this season opened, missing most of the club's games due to a series of colds and attacks of grippe. His physicians believed he would play better hockey if he spent most of his time in a comparatively milder winter climate.
BO-TON, Dec. 28.—The purchase of Paul Haynes, 24-year-old centre from Montreal Maroons, tonight forced the Boston Bruins management to make several changes with the Cubs, its Canadian-American Hockey League farm team.
To make room for Haynes on the Bruins' roster, Frank Jerwa was returned to the Cubs, along with Jack Portland, a defence spare. Bert McInerney was promoted from the Cubs to the Bruins to fill in for Portland, who, general manager Art Ross said, was in need of further seasoning.
It is likely that the Bruins will pick up another defenceman before Sunday's game with the Rangers in New York. Burrage, Lamport, who teamed with Portland, will probably be traded within a day or so.
In announcing the acquisition of Haynes, who reports to the Bruins in New York Sunday night, Ross said the Bruins had been trying to get him since last season.

ROACH WILL REPLACE SMITH

DETROIT, Dec. 28.—Ruffed by the recent slump of Detroit Red Wings, Manager Jack Adams today announced a shakeup of the team. John Ross Roach, veteran goalie, will be brought up from the Olympics of the International Hockey League to replace voicing Normie Smith in the nets. Eddie Goodfellow will return to his old position at centre on the line with Eddie Wiseman and Johnny Sorrell and a left winger, probably Wilf Starr, will be recruited from the Olympics. These changes will become effective Sunday night when the Wings oppose New York Americans.
"The Wings have lost the fight they had last season when they won the league championship and went to the Stanley Cup finale," said Adams in explaining the shakeup.

Eagles In Trading Deal
