## U. N. B. SQUAD HOLDS BANQUET

FREDERICTON, Nov. 26.—The rugby squad of the University of New Brunswick held its banquet tonight to wind up the season of 1922. The Clark trophy, emblematic of the title of the western intercollegiate section, which is the original intercollegiate league, graced the board adorned with the red and black of U. N. B. The team of 1922 put on a record of never being scored upon in any way during a season of seven matches, six of which were won and one of which was a scoreless tie. A rugby football team so strong in defence never before represented the provincial university.

The team had as captain C. G. Jewett, of Fredericton, with K. P. MacKenzie as vice-captain, G. A. Mowatt, of Campbellton, was manager and Jack Oston, of Fredericton, coach.

If the team of 1911 can repeat by winning the western section, the Clark trophy will become the permanent property of U. N. B. as winner three years in succession.

Officers of the team were elected today. Ralph E. Second, of St. John, was elected captain and Gordon W. Jones, of Moncton, vice-captain. Second is a half back and Jones a forward.

The manager of the hockey team for 1923 also was elected today. Bernard H. Hagerman, of Fredericton, was chosen.

## France Will Combat Stenography's Lure

## Baron Sonnino Dead In Italy

ROME Nov. 25.—Baron Sonnino twice premier of Italy, and also foreign minister during the great war, died tonight.

Baron Sidney Sonnino, "the silent statesman of Italy," disliked to talk but could be fluent in five languages. He was Prime Minister of Italy in 1906 and again in 1910. From 1914 to 1919 he was minister of finance, as minister of the interior and as a member of Parliament. He brought to the Paris peace conference the reputation of "the first financier of Europe, the man who had probed the economic life of the world to the core."

"I do not shine, I do not glitter," he said on one occasion in the Chamber of Deputies. "I leave that sort of thing to my political opponents. I am satisfied if I can reveal an occasional gleam of commonsense."

At another time, addressing his indifferent colleagues, he said: "I propose to put a little knowledge of the state of the nation's revenue into your heads, whether you feel interested or not."

larged Canadian trade in that quarter is not particularly bright. It will be well not to expect too much lest we be disappointed. Of one thing, however, we may rest assured. If anything at all is gained the bureau of Liberal propaganda at Ottawa will not fail to tell the country all about it in glowing language.

We note some revival of talk about constructing the projected tunnel between England and France. Engineers have agreed that it is entirely practicable. The chalk formation will make the work of boring easy. Trial borings all the way across and actual trial tunnels extending inward under water from the opposite shores have demonstrated that the chalk is firm and impervious to water. The plans provide for a double tunnel each 20 feet in diameter and 45 feet apart. Below and midway between the two railway tunnels will be a smaller channel for drainage. The entire length of excavations will be 30 miles, 20 miles being under the sea and five miles on each side under the land surface. Six years will be required for the work of construction and when it is completed the trains will be operated by electricity.

Newspaper reports tell that in the past year over 10,000 persons were killed outright in motor car accidents in 34 of the 48 United States, while three times as many more were crippled or injured. This is an awful holocaust equaling the number of killed and wounded in a great battle. Allowing for the states not heard from the number killed in this way in the Republic would just about equal to the total population of the city of Charlottetown. The worst feature of it all is that most of these thousands were slain because the drivers of cars were reckless, careless, drunk, or unskilled in their calling and that very few of them were adequately punished for their offences.

The World Conference on Prohibition now going on in Toronto is a very notable gathering of men and women inspired by the aim to shut out the liquor traffic from every country in the world. It is a high and worthy ideal and its attainment would add greatly to the welfare and happiness of mankind. The meeting in Toronto should be an inspiration to Prohibitionists in this Province to take a stride forward and shut out the further importation of liquor here. The coming plebiscite provides the opportunity. It should be improved by rolling up the biggest possible majority at the polls. Every lover of sobriety and order should rally to the polls and make the day eventful.

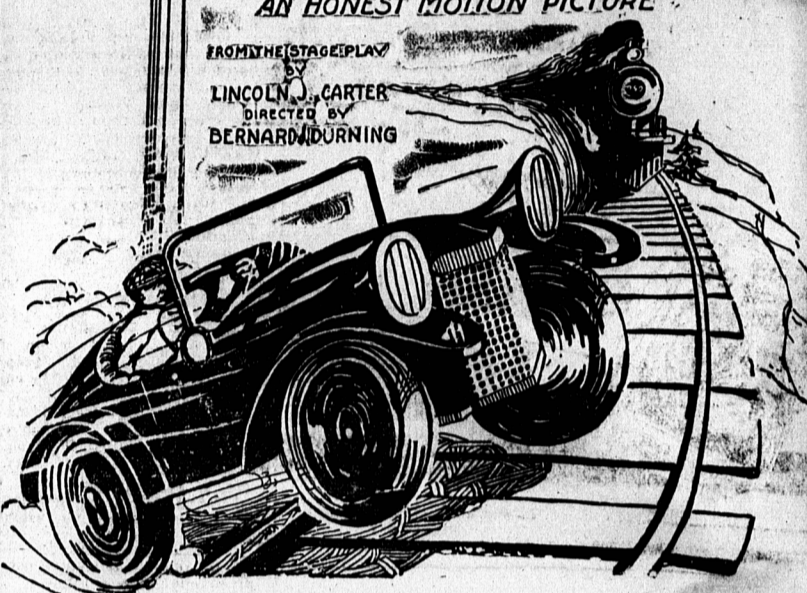
