NOTES BY THE WAY

Those who remember the Dominion election of 1911 will recall the famous Liberal slogan of that time, "Let Laurier Finish His Work." All the newspaper organs of the party in power at that time made a truly liberal display of the famous five-word sentence...

but in a Liberal exchange we find evidence that faith in slogans is no yet dead in Sackville, for there we read, "Let Veniot Finish His Work." This is, no doubt, intended to help Premier Veniot, his colleagues and party, and not to hurt them, but at the same time it may recall unpleasant memories in the Liberal camp...

The Liberal leaders have had much to depress them of late, having lost their allied control of Ontario, with defeat in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Alberta—five provinces within four years. And just now in the apparent peril of losing New Brunswick political pessimism has enveloped them like a London fog...

Premier Veniot's only hope is to save himself by a narrow and reduced majority. That was Premier Armstrong's best hope, till the last year of the legislative term. What encouragement does their example give to the last gasp? Behind him is the long list of provincial losses and defeats and before him a seemingly hopeless outlook.

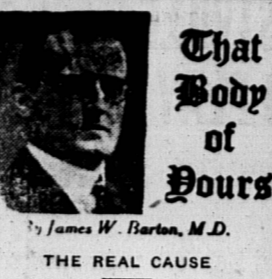
And there is no optimism in the Progressive camp. Mr. Harry Leader, M.P. for Portage La Prairie has been lately talking of their troubles and handicaps in an address to his constituents. He admitted that "there is a general feeling throughout the country that the Progressive Party is a failure" but did not himself agree with that view of the case...

This reads very like a confession that the party is a failure, as the Winnipeg Tribune says. It seems to have proved a failure in Ontario, where the Drury Government went down to defeat and the number of Progressives in the House was cut in half in the provincial election of 1923. Its failure in the Maritimes is shown by the omission to nominate candidates in the provincial elections of this year.

There will be suspense throughout the country until the elections in New Brunswick and the Dominion are over, the more intense because of the uncertainty of the results that may develop. This suspense halts business, is a brake upon the wheels of industry and is injurious in many ways, individually and collectively. It should be terminated as speedily as possible by bringing on the Dominion election or by a definite announcement that there will be no election till next year.

There is little hope, however, of this course being adopted. The Government does not know its own mind and in no part of the country is the suspense more painful than in the Council Chamber at the Capital. Hundreds upon hundreds of prospective candidates for the Commons, applicants for vacant Senatorships and other offices along with the entire business community are left in the meantime to wait between hope and fear the announcement of some definite decision at Ottawa.
