CRESTON, IOWA, Mar. 15. - Authorities here tonight wired to New Jersey a description of a baby said to resemble Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., found late today at a local hotel with a woman who gave her name as Mrs. Florence Bayn of Arizona. Mrs. Bayn said she came here from Waterloo, Iowa, where she had been visiting an uncle and was working her way back to Arizona. She said the child was born Jan. 31, 1931, following her second husband's desertion.

Husband Retaliates By Killing Wife And Daughter

YONKERS, N. Y., March 17-Mrs. Margaret Nunes, who had her husband arrested on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated last week, and their daughter, who testified at the hearing, were killed in their sleep early today. Half an hour later Alexander Nunes was arrested and confessed. Police said, he had killed his wife and child, 14 year-old Marie.

Serious Shooting In Michigan Jail

IONIA, Mich., Mar. 17- One guard was accidentally shot by a companion today and three others were stabbed in an attempt to subdue an unruly prisoner in the Michigan state reformatory here. Milne Patrick, 40, reformatory guard, is in a Grand Rapids Hospital, with a bullet wound in his back, received when Frank Leland, Deputy Assistant Warden, opened fire on the prisoner, Walter Sanders, a negro, who had refused to give up a knife he apparently had fashioned from a piece of steel. Patrick also received a slash on the neck from the prisoner's knife. Leland, Ford Moyer and S. V. Hidden, other guards, received minor knife wounds during the battle.

General Labor Strike In Poland WARSAW, Poland, March 17-(A.P.)-Two persons were killed today and many injured in disorders attending a general strike of some 26,000 workers throughout Poland. Labor unions proclaimed the walk-out in protest against labor bills recently passed by the Sejm, and although Warsaw was not seriously affected various points in the provinces had disturbances. Newspapers were suppressed at Crakow and when police there forcibly dispersed a demonstration on the street, one injured and 120 arrested. One was shot to death and three wounded when police fired on demonstrators at Zywice who attempted to attack the local administration. Some 20,000 men struck at Lodz. A Socialist newspaper was suppressed and several radicals rounded up here. Public meetings were banned.

Fiancee's Farewell Has Tragic End NEW YORK, N. Y., March 17- Flying over the French liner Ile De France as a farewell gesture to his fiancee who was sailing on the liner from Havre, France, for New York today, Perre Vaulaer dropped into the sea and was rescued by a crew from the ship, according to a message received at the office of the line here. Vaulaer was uninjured but his plane was lost. The name of the fiancee was not revealed.
Annie Semple Hutton Ill In Hospital LOS ANGELES, Calif., Mar. 17.-Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson Hutton, Evangelist, today showed a prompt favorable reaction to a blood transfusion, it was stated last night by her physicians. A bulletin issued by the physicians, who performed the operation, early yesterday at a hospital, said she was "doing splendidly." A pint of blood was furnished by Lester J. Hays, an assistant Y. M.
