# EATING WITH BRITISH ROYALTIES

(Copyright by Montreal Star news Bureau)

These recipes are taken from the old household "Scrap Book" started by Queen Victoria in 1831. To this book various members of the Royal Family have contributed directions for the preparation of their favorite dishes. Contrary to general belief, the meals of the British Royal Family are not elaborate. Canadian housewives.

**SAUCE PIQUANT FOR CHICKENS**  
 Squeeze the juice from an orange, strain it, then add white wine, rose-water, ground ginger, ground mace, sugar and melted butter to taste. Cook over the fire till well mixed and mellow then serve.

**QUEEN MARY THE FIRST'S SAUCE**  
 (To Serve with a Shoulder of Mutton)

Three-parts roast a well-hung shoulder of mutton, then put a soup plate under it with a quart cup each of hot water and port wine, a shallot, one anchovy, finely chopped, and a little pepper. Baste the meat with this and the gravy that drops from it. When meat is tender place on a hot dish, the inside upwards, score it with a knife, pour the gravy over, and sprinkle thickly with fine fresh breadcrumbs fried in butter.

**KING EDWARD'S SAUCE**  
 (From Queen Victoria's Book Date 1881)

(Recipe in an unknown handwriting)  
 This sauce is known in the Royal kitchens today as "King Edward's Sauce." It was originally invented for His Royal Highness in the year 1861, long before he ascended the throne.

Take 4 hard yolks of eggs, 4 anchovies, washed and wiped, a handful of tarragon, chervil, burnet, chives—these to be well par-boiled and afterwards pressed in a cloth to extract all water—a tablespoonful of capers, a tablespoonful of French mustard, and 3 raw yolks of eggs.

Place all those in a mortar and bruise together with a pestle, and then proceed to work in nearly 1/2 pint fresh salad oil and 1/2 gill tarragon vinegar by degrees. When this is done rub the sauce through a hair sieve. This is to be eaten with boiled fish or meats, and also makes a good accompaniment to fish, game and poultry salads.

**STRAWBERRY SAUCE**  
 (As made by the Cook of King Henry the VIII.)

Take of powdered rue, powdered dandelion flowers and roots, pepper and salt. Work them altogether in a mortar with a pestle along with the yolks of hard-boiled eggs, and mingle with hot sour milk. Serve with hot strawberries.

**NOTE**—Sounds as if it would make a good dressing for salads when cold.

## THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)  
 MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—The export business in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was quiet owing to the fact that few firm offers were received and only sales of odd loads of grain were made.

There was some enquiry for ocean grain from west St. John and Portland for January loading and engagements were made at firm rates. A good business was done in cash grain in the domestic market including some No. 4 barley at two cents per bushel over the December option bay ports. A steady feeling prevailed in the market for oats with Ontario and Quebec No. 2 wheat grades were quoted at 55 1/2 cents No. 3 wheat at 52 cents and No. 4 wheat at 50 1/2 cents per bushel extracked.

Ontario malting barley changed hands at 86 1/2 cents bushel extracked. Prices for all grades of flour were well maintained under a steady demand. The demand for milled continues. Prices were steady. The underline to the market for standard grades of rolled oats remains strong. Little business was transacted in the egg market owing to the holiday. The butter and cheese markets were also steady. No eggs were in the market today government holiday.
