Denounce Radio Crime Programmes

WINDSOR, ONT., Sept. 1--(CP)--Radio programs and motion pictures glorifying criminal characters to the discredit of law enforcement officials, should be discouraged, the police association of Ontario said today in a resolution passed at the concluding business of the organization's convention here.

The resolution followed discussion of an article by Daniel Thompson, editor and manager of the Canadian National Police Review, who described as "a national shame" the type of crime programs made available to juveniles by Canadian radio stations.

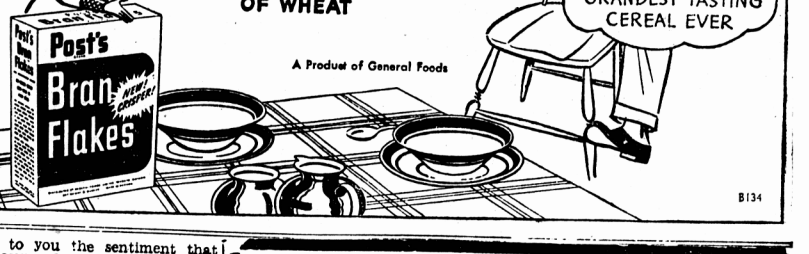

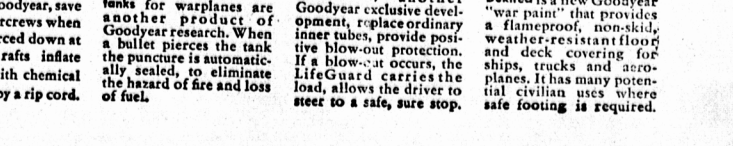
