Many supposedly fine players think they can do very well without such devices, but deals like today's prove that their self-confidence is not always justified.

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

North-South were players of some reputation. The bidding went:

South	West	North	East
1♠	Pass	1♦	Pass
1♥	Pass	4NT	Pass
Pass	Pass		

Since North-South were not using a slam convention, there was no real obligation for South to bid over four notrump, which became merely a strong invitation. Of course it can be argued with considerable logic that South should have elected to make another bid, since he had three aces North, with a maximum of one ace, must have quite a hand to give such a vehement slam try. But in the final analysis, the fault was really the partnership's for not using a conventional four notrump bid. Surely, with South opening the bidding, North could immediately see the chance for at least a small slam, and should have been he, not South, who determined the final contract after learning about South's ace-holding.

Dispensing with a sound four-notrump convention raises this great psychological difficulty: one partner, who has considerable strength in kings and queens, but fears that the partnership lacks two aces; the other partner, who may be well supplied with the highest-ranking cards, may nevertheless take a pessimistic view because of his total lack of "fillers." That, obviously enough, was the situation in this case.
